
Afresh start for Brittain

Veteran OHL winger traded to Plymouth

Josh Brittain is now playing for his third OHL team in less than a year, and didn't need long to make an impact with his new club.

Traded to the 1 Plymouth Whalers Friday for a pair of high draft picks, the 19-year-old left winger scored the game winner and finished at a plus-4 in Saturday's 6-1 home-ice rout of the Belleville Bulls.



While certainly happy to score in his first weekend with the Whalers, Brittain is even more pleased to be getting a fresh start after struggling for ice time with the offensively-deep Barrie Colts.

"I'm not really sure why (I wasn't getting much ice time). It's not like I was playing bad. It was getting frustrating," noted the six-foot-fourinch, 210-pounder, who had three goals and five assists in 12 games this year with Barrie. "I'm actually really happy to be here in Plymouth. I'm still with a contender and this is a great, close-knit group of guys."

Saturday marked the 70th goal as an OHLer (including one in playoffs) for Brittain, a third-round draft pick of the Anaheim Ducks in 2008.

Drew Dutton assisted on the second goal, while he, Abraham and fellow local George Kopas delivered some sound penalty killing to keep hopes of victory alive.

Rounding out the midgets' Milton contingent are Colin Christie, Matt Dupont, Oran Ferguson and Dan Plater.

Now 2-4 in SCTA play, the Hurricanes will look to get back in the win column tonight, when they begin a three-game road trip in Brampton.

BR delivers back-to-back wins in debut on new field



T eading onto his school's new artificial turf field I for the last time Friday, Michael Haringa knew he was capable of and prepared for the task at hand.

Just an hour-and-a-half earlier he'd booted a field goal of 37 yards — eight more than the one he was now asked to deliver in the Royals' last-ditch effort to chris-
