Beer drinking at Evergreen cemetery resumes; some found drunk there

July 1914


We are informed that the beerdrinking of last summer, in the new (Evergreen) cemetery, reported then in the Champion, has been resumed, that the beer is brought in milk cans from the brewery, that it is consumed in the caretaker's toolhouse and that some of the drinkers have been drunk there. The excessive drinking is bad enough but in this case taking the scene of it into account, desecration is added.

Town 'Council: Waterworks extension passed last year be carried out as follows: Robert St. from Ruddy's corner to Wm. Hamilton's; Prince St. from Jas. Weir's house to Bruce St. and Oak St. from Pine to Bruce. In Bousfield's survey the hydrant will be removed to the corner of Court St. and a two-inch pipe laid to corner of Woodward Ave.

The tenders for the proposed new Registry Office were not opened on Monday as had been arranged. Contractors were not ready. There is dissatisfaction here with the specifications. It had been expected that the building would be stone to match the court house. The specifications call for brick walls with a six inches facing of Credit Valley stone, the trimmings to be of artificial stone, such as that of the Roman Stone Co. The foundation is to be brick.

on Bronte to Main, east on Main to Martin and north on Martin to Livingston Park where addresses will be delivered. A special train will start from Oakville for Milton at 10:15. This is its time table: Oakville, 10:15; Bronte 10:25; Burlington Jct., 10:40; Tansley 10:50; Ash, 11 Returning will leave Milton at 5:30 p.m.

The central office of the Bell Telephone Co. has been painted and decorated and the unsightly old verandah has been removed from its front. There are several verandahs on Main Street. They are relics of the earlier history of Milton and it may be on this account that their owners have not demolished them.

Messrs. French and Wright, a deputation from Etobicoke, appeared before council to discuss the proposed radial electric line, Toronto to Milton, through the townships of Etobicoke, Toronto and Trafalgar. Mr. French said the proposal had been submitted to the Hydro-Electric Commission, who had promised that if the three townships and Milton asked them to do so they would survey the proposed line, making no charge for doing so.

The rails have been laid on the C.N.R. electric railway from Toronto to Georgetown and the work will soon be done as far as Acton. Date of opening not announced.
