Conquering fear of swimming, Hutt successfully completes her first Ironman in Florida


quick scan of the 2,000-plus competitors poised to hit the water and Andrea Hutt's trepidation came rushing back.

"Yeah, when you see that many people ready for a mass swim it's pretty intimidating," recalled the 35-year-old Miltonian of Ironman debut in Panama City, Florida biking portion of the recent Ironman Florida. November 7. "I definitely had some butter- I felt it was something I just had to over-

Of course that was hardly surprising, with a 2.4-mile swim ahead of her.

Just a year earlier a mere few lengths of the leisure centre pool was an ambitious goal, when Hutt first hooked up with the Milton Masters — determined to squash her fear of swimming and making the transition from team Adventure Racing to triathlons.

She admitted, "I really wasn't a strong swimmer at all. I could barely do a length. I'd always been kind of nervous in the water, but

come, and a good friend doing the Ironman last year kind of inspired me."

Armed with ample determination and plenty of support from both the Masters and some local triathletes — most notably Jane Wood — Hutt made extraordinary strides at the leisure centre and Kelso Conservation Area and successfully completed six triathlons before taming the summer-ending Half-Ironman 70.3 Muskoka.

Still, the high-endurance racer had doubts about making that final jump to full Ironman competition.

And the rough currents caused by the recent Hurricane Ida certainly didn't ease those concerns, nor did the occasional foot or calf grabs from fellow participants that one inevitably experiences during the event's initial leg.

"You get squeezed in there pretty tight with so many people competing. Fortunately I didn't take any whacks to the head. I got my feet and thighs grabbed a few times, but pick of the Anaheim Ducks — has 14 when I did I just swam harder, like as to say
