Impressive start for D-1 rookie

Alexander makes immediate impact with Syracuse Orange

uentin Hillsman knew he'd recruited a "special player" in Kayla Alexander, but figured it might take a while for the rest of the NCAA's Big East Conference to realize that as well.

So much for that notion.

As much an opponent to be concerned about now as a player to watch for in the future, Syracuse University's blue-chip freshman centre is paying immediate dividends — and is a key reason why the Rochester, New York-based Orange is off to its best start (9-0) in more than 30 years and just recently cracked the USA Today/ESPN Top 25.

Counting 11 points and four rebounds toward Sunday's 56-42 victory over Dartmouth, Alexander has double-digits in six of nine games and — despite not having a distinct size and strength advantage over her average rival like she did in high school — remains a consistent rebounding force.


"We expected Kayla to be a special player here. But she's been doing it since day one and that's the surprising thing," Hillsman told the Champion late last week.

Of course the six-foot-four-inch cager's track record strongly suggested she'd become an impact player in the NCAA sooner or later.

Along with being part of the National Elite Development Academy in Hamilton and leading Milton District to the Halton AA title last fall. Alexander already has a fair amount of international experience under her belt — most recently as a twoway standout for Team Canada at this past summer's FIBA U19 World Championships in Thailand.

That kind of elite-level competition, she's convinced, has helped pave the way for a smooth transition to university ball.

"The international experience I've had over the past couple of years has definitely been great preparation
