The postcards were delivered — along with a strong message — to Queen's Park last summer.

"We asked the citizens of Milton to respond to the need of the hospital and did they ever," Pomeroy said in his acceptance speech.

The Lifetime Achievement Award went to the three men responsible for founding the Milton Lions Club, George Clements, who wasn't able to make the ceremony, Gus Mowbray and Sam Nadalin.

The local group was formed in 1963. Almost 50 years later, the club continues to raise large amounts of money for causes around town including the CT Scanner Campaign and local schools.

Clements' sister, Donna Coulter, spoke on behalf of the recipients, who continue to be involved to this day. Her words were followed by an invitation from emcee Mark Curtis: "It's fitting to show our respect, love and gratitude by a standing ovation."

The crowd rose to its feet.

The Civic Improvement Award went to Emil Georgiev and Kamen Kostabinov for their renovation to the Thai House Cuisine building on Main Street downtown, which in the early 1900s was a shoe factory.

In accepting the award, Georgiev said at the start of the project they wondered if Milton was the right town for the project.

"Now we know for sure it was the right town."


