Obama's order preventing public funding of abortions would be welcome here

DEAR EDITOR:

It's to be hoped that U.S. President Barack Obama will honour his promise of an executive order restricting use of federal funds for abortion services and that the order will prove to be effective.

Although many leading U.S. pro-life advocates are deeply disappointed by the omission from the health care bill of wording forbidding use of federal funds for abortions, the executive order would show that, at least, the White House is more in tune with the wishes of Americans than our federal and provincial governments are of Canadians' wishes.

A CNN/Opinion Research Corp. survey issued in November 2009 showed that 61 per cent of the American public oppose the use of public money to pay for abortions.

In the same month, a poll by the Environics Research Group for Life Canada found that 67 per cent of Canadians (66 per cent in Ontario) oppose public funding of abortions, with exceptions for emergency situations.

The direct cost of abortions in Ontario is \$30 million a year — \$30 million that two-thirds of the citizens of the province prefer the government to invest in healthcare elsewhere.
