Schedule outdoor physical activities when UV rays are at their weakest, before 11 a.m. and after 4 p.m;

 Always keep children under the age of one out of the sun;

Cover heads, necks and ears with broad-brimmed when outdoors.





As a lifelong Miltonian who's learned to drive in the past few years, I can truthfully say that where some people decide to park in residential areas creates a driving hazard. For example, turning left from Syer Drive onto Laurier Avenue, one nearly has to be entirely past the stop sign in order to see around the cars parked not only on the street, but also on the boule-

This blocks the view of pos-

sible oncoming traffic from either the stop lights at Laurier and Thompson Road or the three-way stop at Laurier and Coxe Boulevard.

This is just one of many examples in this neighbourhood alone. Hayward Crescent, across from Laurier Park, is also notoriously bad for parked cars on the street.
