## MFC bid for final 4 falls one goal short

Edged by Portugal FC in quarterfinals

Illtown FC rediscovered its IVI scoring touch, just not quite enough of it to keep its inaugural season alive.

On the heels of backto-back shutout defeats Milltown FC - its longest losing streak of the year — the local expansion club held a pair of second-half leads in its must-win quarterfinal clash at Toronto's Stadium Lamport Saturday evening.

However, Portugal FC managed to even the count each time - potting the final equalizer with less than 10 minutes to go — and close things out in a 2-2 deadlock. This gave the hosts narrow advancement to the semifinals, as MFC had been edged 1-0 in the two-game, totalgoals-wins opener last Tuesday.

"We're obviously disappointed to go out in the first round, but we fought hard tonight and went out

with our heads held high," said president and co-owner Dino Rossi, whose team went 12-5-7 in the regular season — finishing fourth, andjust three points out of top spot, in the Canadian Soccer League.

Among MFC's key mid-season pick-ups, forward Martin Artale

scored both goals in the do-or-die showdown. His second of the night — a blistering 16-yard strike - came in the 75th minute, shortly after Portugal FC squared things up.

Artale put the visitors ahead late in the first half on a rebound header, set up by a fierce header from Thierry Mangwa-Batomen that Portugal FC keeper Mike Silva couldn't quite handle.

Despite missing midfield anchor Martijn Kuijpers, out with a torn ligament in his ankle, MFC controlled most of the game and had numerous quality scoring opportunities. Among them was a low roller by scoring leader Lesly St. Fleur that just went wide and a 25-yard strike in the dying moments of play.
