

# AA bantams secure share of first with two more wins

Opening up November with two more victories, Milton's AA bantams now sit at 8-1-3 — good enough for a share of top spot in Tri County's Bowen Division.

Most recently the Winterhawks doubled up the Orangeville Flyers Tuesday night at Milton Sports Centre.

That was thanks to a strong finish, in which Matthew Lenahan and captain Ben Preisner scored third-period goals to complete a comeback.

Austin Dezeeuw had a goal and an assist, while Jacob Quinn also found the back of the net and Sean Walter contributed a pair of helpers.
