Talking about inflation, Regional Councillor Jack Raftis claims those department heads employed by the region and reporting to the Chief Administrative Officer are being recommended for substantial raises. Currently the regional brass earns from \$20,000 to \$28,000. If the schedule Raftis refers to is adopted, the range will be from \$29,000 to \$36,000. That gives the low man on the totem pole a raise of some \$9,000. . . . more than a lot of people earn in a year.

. . Provincial Treasurer Darcy McKeough provided additional assistance for municipalities in his recent budget. At the same time he has urged municipalities in Ontario to ride herd on spending. It's conceivable that the extra money will be used to keep mill rate increases down. But on the other hand the extra funding could simply serve to whet the appetites of municipal councils who always have more worthy projects to do than dollars to pay for them. To quote regional chairman Al Masson, "towns and regions are spending money like drunken sailors." Therein lies the danger.

Mayor Anne MacArthur said he was respected "very much" by all who knew him, and that he served Milton "diligently and well."








