

Will appeal CAS budget

Halton Regional Council will lodge an official appeal against the budget being proposed by Halton Children's Aid Society. The budget proposal reflects an increase of 38 per cent.

Council passed a resolution to that effect but agreed the appeal would be withdrawn at a later date if a new budget, reflecting cuts, could be presented.

The Society had planned a board meeting to go over the entire budget and consider possible areas of reductions. CAS Director Gordon Askwith had met with treasurer Don Farmer and Chief Administrative Officer Ernie Reid to peruse the CAS bud-

Question staff Reporting on that meeting, Councillor David Coons said the CAS had miscalculated possible revenue. He noted the addition of two and a half staff people was also

questioned. The resolution passed made no reference to how much should be cut or what degree of increase would be acceptable. In an interview following the meeting Dr. Askwith said the greatest degree of increase was in

direct care for children. Dr. Askwith noted the underestimated revenue could amount to several thousands of dollars. That revenue comes to the Society as a result of the Society handling cases from other

Dr. Askwith pointed out the additional staff required would be necessary to handle the extra workload. If the extra work wasn't incured, the additional revenue wouldn't be realized.

Care for 150 Last year the Society budgeted for 117 children in care but at its peak had 150 in care. Dr. Askwith said there were currently 148 children in the Society's care.

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"The big increase is in the area of foster parents and group homes. More adolescents need more care. It costs less to have them in our own homes than to send them

"It is difficult to see where substantial cuts can be made without a reduction in service. So many of our costs for foster parents or group

CAS treasurer Bill DeVries said the total 1974 budget was \$610,462 and the 1975 budget is \$834,589. He said the region pays a share of about approximately 20 per cent. Until this year the region share worked out closer to 33 per

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
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
