Sheridan offers coaches course

The next Level 1 Coaching Development program for amateur sports coaches will be given Monday, April 21, at the Sheridan College Oakville Campus and Wednesday, April 23 at the Brampton Campus.

The session, presented in co-operation with the Ministry of Community and Social Services, will run every Monday and Wednesday for four weeks from 7 to 9 p.m.

Members of the Milton Coaches Association will be attending the seminars with hopes of advancing through to their Level Two and Level Three coaching certificates.

Formal training
The program aims at providing amateur coaches with an opportunity to receive formal training in the science and art of coaching; improving leadership skills; and upgrading coaching knowledge.

Participants who successfully complete all three levels of Level 1 (theory, technical and practical working experience) will be certified as a Level I Coach by the Sports and Recreation Bureau and qualified to enter Level II.

Some of the topics will include the role of the coach, motor learning, psychology of sport, sports medicine, growth and development, biomechanics, physiology of exercise, and training methods. The next coaching development program will be offered in the fall.

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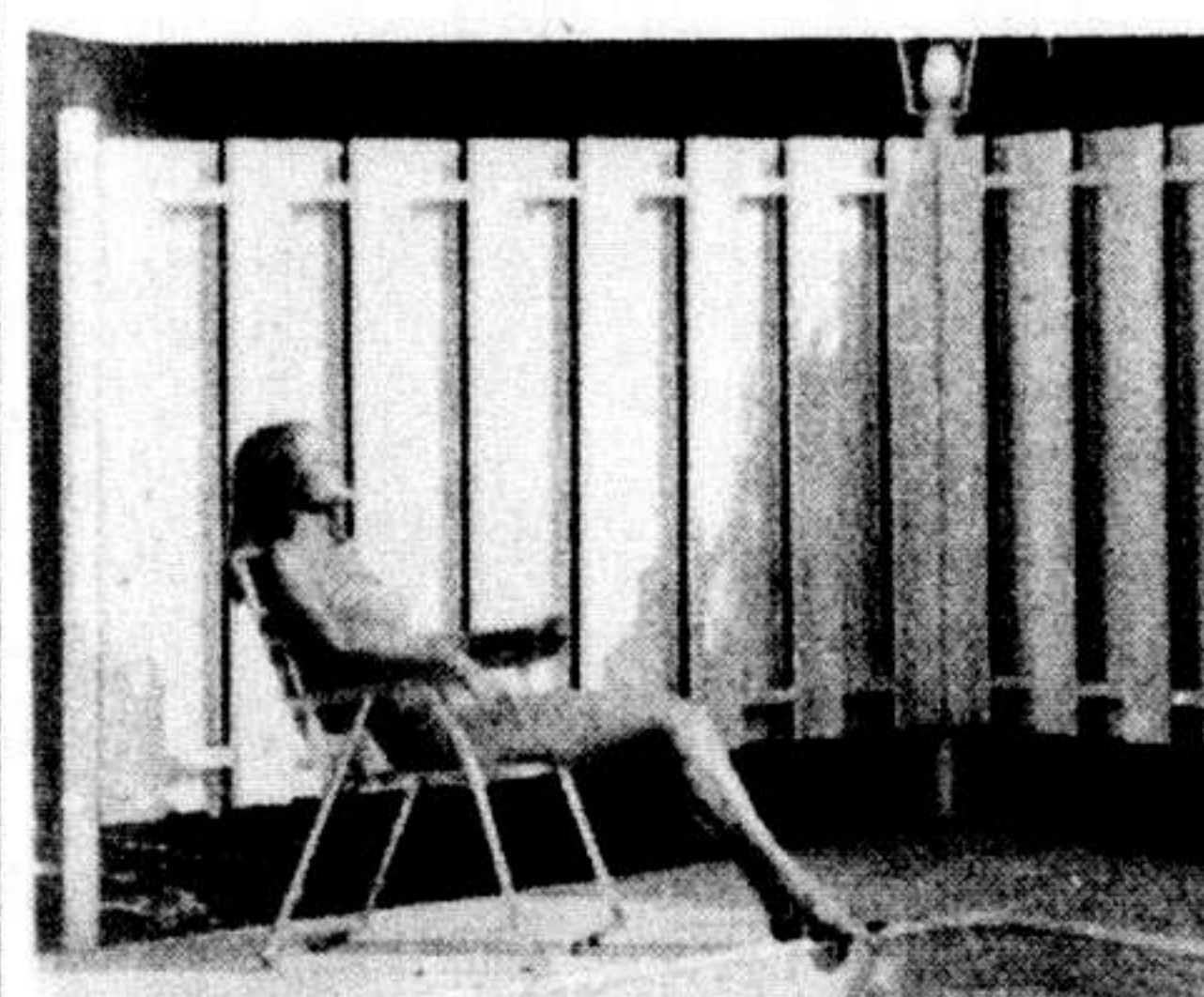
