**Dr. Philbrook:**

# To explain tax

Residents in Halton are reacting to the recent federal budget in much the same way as people are throughout Canada, according to Halton MP Dr. Frank Philbrook.

In an interview this week Dr. Philbrook said his riding office has received numerous calls and letters protesting the 10 cent a gallon excise tax on gasoline.

"I've talked to John Turner and my fellow MP's about this and most of them are getting the reaction I'm getting. Obviously people are concerned about having to dig

deeper into their pockets. I think a lot of people don't understand the rationale behind the 10 cent increase and aren't clear on why we had to impose it. I'm going to explain it to the people of Halton. That won't make it any better but I think it is easier to accept once it is explained."

Dr. Philbrook says the tax is a form of revenue collecting for the federal government and it is necessary if Ottawa is to continue its policy of one price for fuel across the country.

He says the country has lost needed support price revenue through continued cuts in the amount of oil exported to the United States.

"We need this revenue to keep the price for gas the same across the country. It will be used to subsidize gasoline prices in Eastern Ontario, Quebec and the Maritimes," Halton's MP explained.

Dr. Philbrook said that once he had finished studying the budget he realized it was necessary to impose the 10 cent a gallon tax.

"If we are going to maintain oil reserves in this country we are going to have to gradually move towards the world price but we want it to rise gradually and not overnight. We have to ensure future supplies and oil is becoming more expensive to produce. Canadian consumers must simply invest more money today so they will have energy tomorrow."

During the budget debate Dr. Philbrook told the House of Commons that "the increases in the price of oil and gas, while unpopular with some people, will be accepted by most as realistic, especially if supplies are thus protected and new sources developed in the process. I know (it will be accepted) because the Canadian people are realistic and gutsy."

Dr. Philbrook said that while all housing plans are inadequate he thinks the budget deal with the problem properly.

"The housing problem is one to be tackled by both governments and the private sector. We have taken measures in the budget that we think will attract private money into housing construction. With guarded optimism we expect housing starts to continue to increase because of the budget," he explained.

Summing up the budget, he termed it "realistic."

# 'Police Safety Guide' case winds up in court this fall

The men, who were living in Toronto at the time of their arrest last winter, face charges of conspiring to defraud the public. If convicted they could go to jail for a maximum of 14 years.

Milton OPP officer Ron Hudd, who was involved in the investigation, said the charges were laid because the men gave prospective advertisers the impression they were affiliated with a police department or were police officers.

Hudd said a total of 75 businessmen in Milton and Georgetown were contacted by the magazine and police believe "a bunch more never came forward and let us know

they had been contacted.

He said the investigation, led by the OPP anti-rackets bureau and involving the Milton OPP and Halton Regional Police, began in December and culminated with the arrest of the three men in February. Police made the arrests shortly after they raided the Toronto offices of the magazine. At the time they seized records indicating some of the list of businesses contacted by the three men.

Police believe as many as 1,200 businessmen in Southern Ontario were contacted about buying ads in the magazine and the men talked to people in only the smaller communities, avoiding Toronto and other

larger centres. The police case contends businessmen would never have considered purchasing ads if they hadn't been led to believe it was in support of their local police force.
