He says the country has lost needed support price revenue through continued cuts in the amount of oil exported to the United States.

"We need this revenue to keep the price for gas the same across the country. It will be used to subsidize gasoline prices in Eastern Ontario, Quebec and the Maritimes," Halton's MP explained.

Dr. Philbrook said that once he had finished studying the budget he realized it was necessary to impose the 10 cent a gallon tax.

"If we are going to maintain oil reserves in this to gradually move towards the world price but we want it to rise gradually and not overnight. We have to ensure future supplies and oil becoming more expensive to produce. Canadian consumers must simply invest more money today so they will have energy tomorrow.,"

During the budget debate Dr. Philbrook told the House Commons that "the increases in the price of oil and gas, while unpopular with some people, will be accepted by most as realistic, especially if supplies are thus protected and new sources developed in the process. know (it will be accepted)


