Pick-your-own marketing has become very popular in the past few years because of its obvious benefits—fresh fruit and vegetables at the lowest possible price.

It's almost time for the raspberry season and Glen and Marlene Inglis of Glenmar Farms are ready for the yearly onslaught of pickers. At 50 cents a pint, the time and effort spent picking one's own fruit will result in a substantial saving.

The season runs from July 13 to August 8 with the best picking time around July 20. Berry pickers are driven to the fields on a tractor-driven wagon to take their choice of the six varieties of berries available.

Location of Glenmar Farms is west on Sideroad 17 off Highway 25 to the Town Line. Follow the signs north on the Town Line to the farm.
