Twelve-year-old Shirley began her summer sessions at the Canadian Gymnastics Federation camp at York University in Toronto Monday. The York training session continues until Friday when Shirley will prepare to relocate in Parry Sound for the Canadette Sports Camp beginning Aug. 25 and continuing until the end of the month.

Definite promise
The bursaries are awarded only to girls who show definite promise in the gymnastics field and who can use the financial assistance to continue their athletic development, notes Halton Gym Club head coach Jill Boothby. The first bursary entitles Shirley to free tuition in the York program and the second grants the 12-year-old free tuition and residence for the length of the Canadette camp.

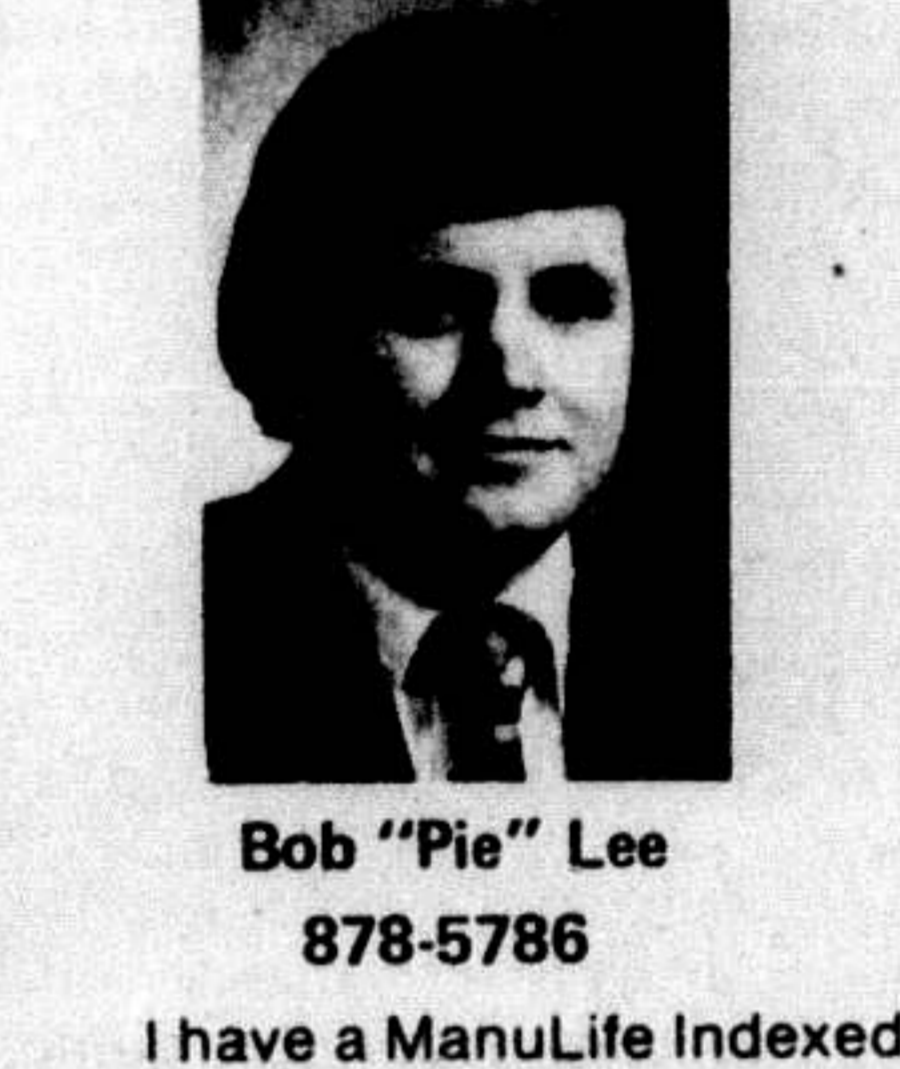
