

Dr. Philbrook also puzzled

Halton MP Dr. Frank Philbrook is just as confused about new proposed federal electoral boundaries in Halton as most of the public. In an interview late Tuesday afternoon Dr. Philbrook said he plans to investigate thoroughly what has been done to his riding. "I haven't really had time to study what has been done to my riding. All I know so far is what I have seen in the paper and using my old riding map, I haven't been able to figure out what I've lost exactly," he complained. When informed that he had lost Georgetown and the part of his riding which is in Wellington County, he said he would complain to the Electoral Boundary Commission.

Disappointed
"I am very disappointed about losing Georgetown and some of Esqueping township. I wanted to keep all of Halton Hills in my riding along with Milton and Oakville. Halton Hills should be all together in one riding," Dr. Philbrook said.

He noted that he had expected to lose Erin and the parts of his riding in Wellington but was surprised to lose Georgetown.

Halton's MP said he only knew what he saw in the daily press advertisements on Tuesday and that MPs weren't given prior warning of the boundary changes.

The only thing he knew about boundary changes was what he had heard in the form of rumors.

"At one time I heard I would lose everything north

of Highway 5 and that was later changed to everything north of Highway 401. I had also heard I would keep Georgetown and Milton and lose Acton. As I said, I knew I would lose Erin and I thought maybe Acton, but not Georgetown," he explained.

Further north Describing the entire matter as "puzzling" Dr. Philbrook said he didn't think keeping Acton but losing Georgetown made sense since Acton is further north. "I love this riding and the people in it. I hate to lose any part of it. One thing, it will be easier to get around the riding now."

In reaction to reports that provincial officials are upset about the announcement because it further confuses voters during an election, Dr. Philbrook said the announcement was merely coincidental. He noted federal boundary changes have been announced in British Columbia and Quebec and Tuesday was simply the day for the announcement for Ontario.

He said he now has 30 days to complain to the commission taking care of boundary changes and that after further study he will lodge a complaint. "If I have lost Georgetown I will certainly be complaining," he vowed.

Not easily moved Dr. Philbrook said he doesn't hold out much chance of a change in the commission's decision, even after his complaints have been heard. He says the commission takes the complaints

into consideration but doesn't often change its mind.

Commenting on the proposed federal riding boundary changes, Halton-Burlington Conservative candidate Gary Dawkins said he felt the announcement at this time would cause even more confusion than that which already exists provincially.

He was the second councillor to die of a heart attack in the first term of regional government for the area. Graham Ripley of Georgetown died before he could assume his elected office in Halton Hills.

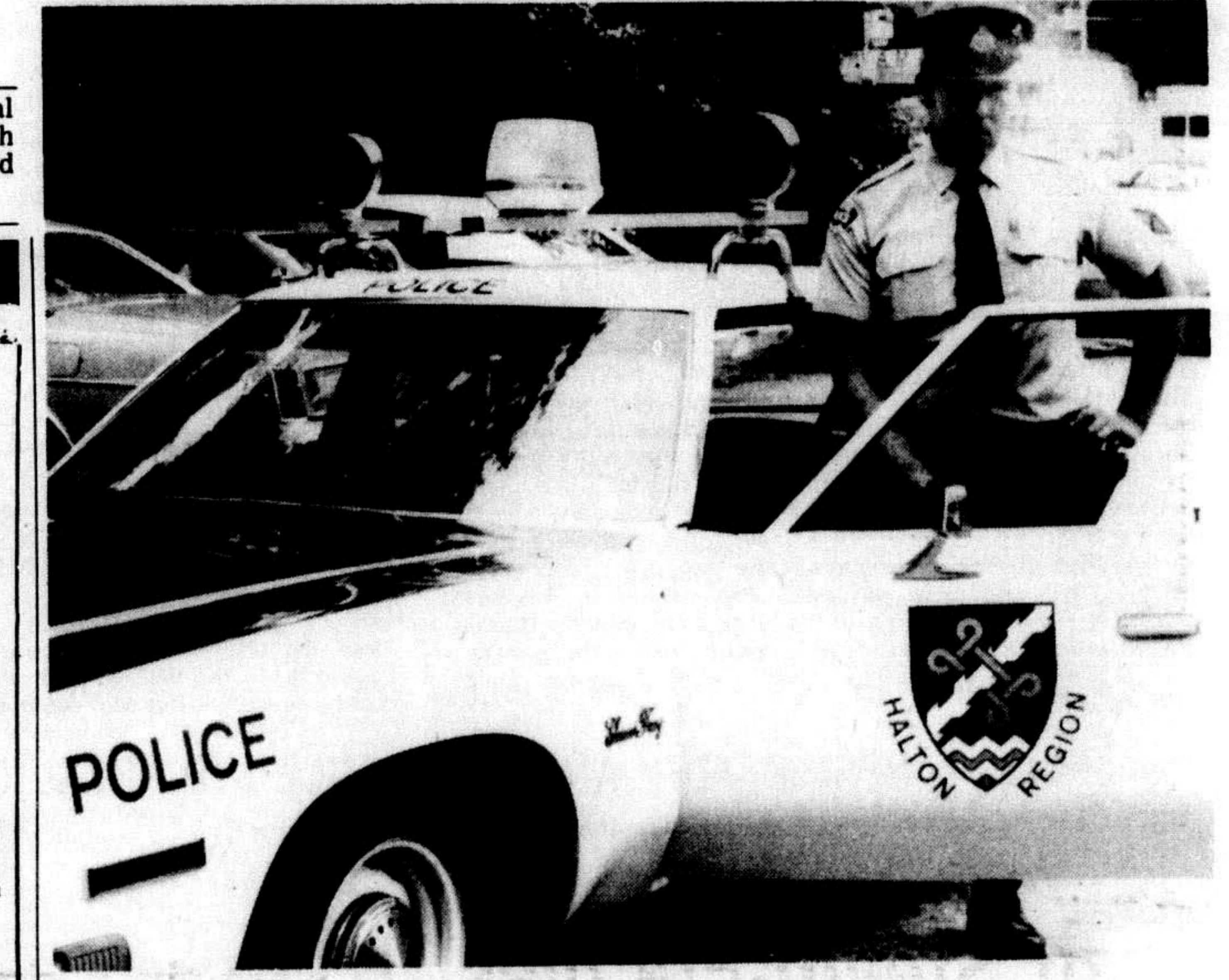



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
