perch and bass. Most of us are optimistic but we think it is going to take a lot of money, work and skill to put our fishing back where it was 10 years ago. True, rainbow trout and coho salmon are the best they have ever been and we hope there is no reason why this cannot

continue. Unfortunately, there are a few who think our minister of natural resources is spending too much money. Our honest opinion is that most of us can afford an extra couple of dollars a year to help keep this wonderful land of ours clean and to help save a wee corner for our kids.

This beautiful coho salmon is a silver-grey fish when caught in the lake, and delicious to eat. Once they start their spawning run they turn a darker color, then nearly black. At this stage the flesh is still good to eat, but always remember to fillet the fish. Do not try to cook it with the skin on, as it is quite oily.


