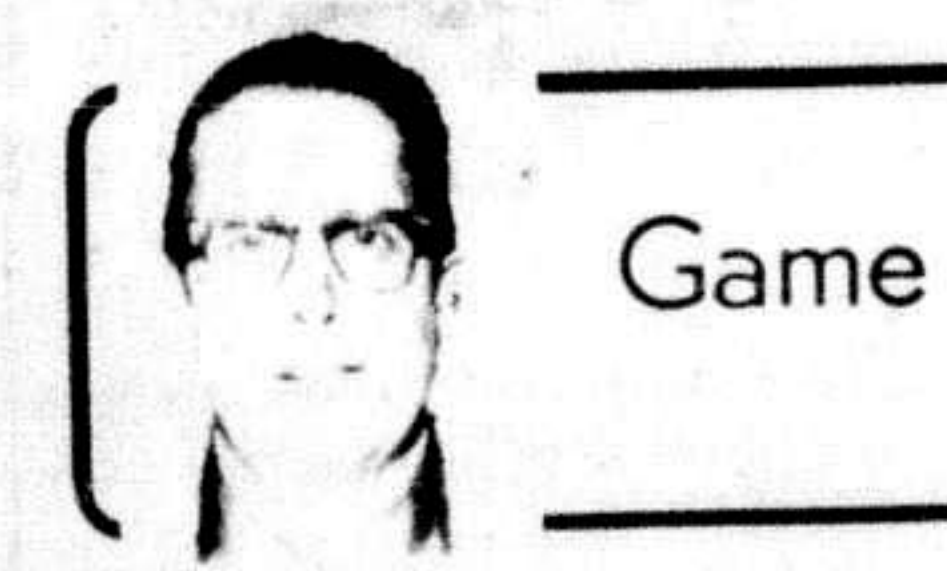

Game & Fish News

What a beautiful summer for the outdoorsman—lots of sunshine, lots of heat and for many, lots of time off. All this puts extra fishing pressure on our lakes, streams and parks.

Tom Ramsdell of Lowville was fishing in Otter Lake at Parry Sound and caught a beautiful 18 lb. pike. This fish was 18 inches around the girth. Nice going Tom, we hope you catch it mate.

Arn Coulson was drift fishing from his cottage on Sturgeon Lake with his wife Helen and caught a 6 3/4 lb. pickerel. The fish was caught with a dew worm and a pearl spinner and was ably netted by his fishing partner Helen.

Shirley Lyons caught a nice 6 1/4 lb. pike and "Mississippi" Ken Hill caught a 2 1/2 lb. smallmouth bass. Peter Zeenan of Oakville phoned me to report catching a 22 lb. muskie in the Kawartha Lakes area, on a red eye.

For a few weeks the coho salmon will be schooling up at the mouth of the Credit, 12 and 16 Mile Creeks as they prepare to take their final run up the creek to spawn and die. Unfortunately the eggs of these fish will not hatch as they are primarily a salt water fish. A few are being caught by trolling with a variety of lake trout lures at a level of about 30 feet.

This beautiful coho salmon is a silver-grey fish when caught in the lake, and delicious to eat. Once they start their spawning run they turn a darker color, then nearly black. At this stage the flesh is still good to eat, but always remember to fillet the fish. Do not try to cook it with the skin on, as it is quite oily.

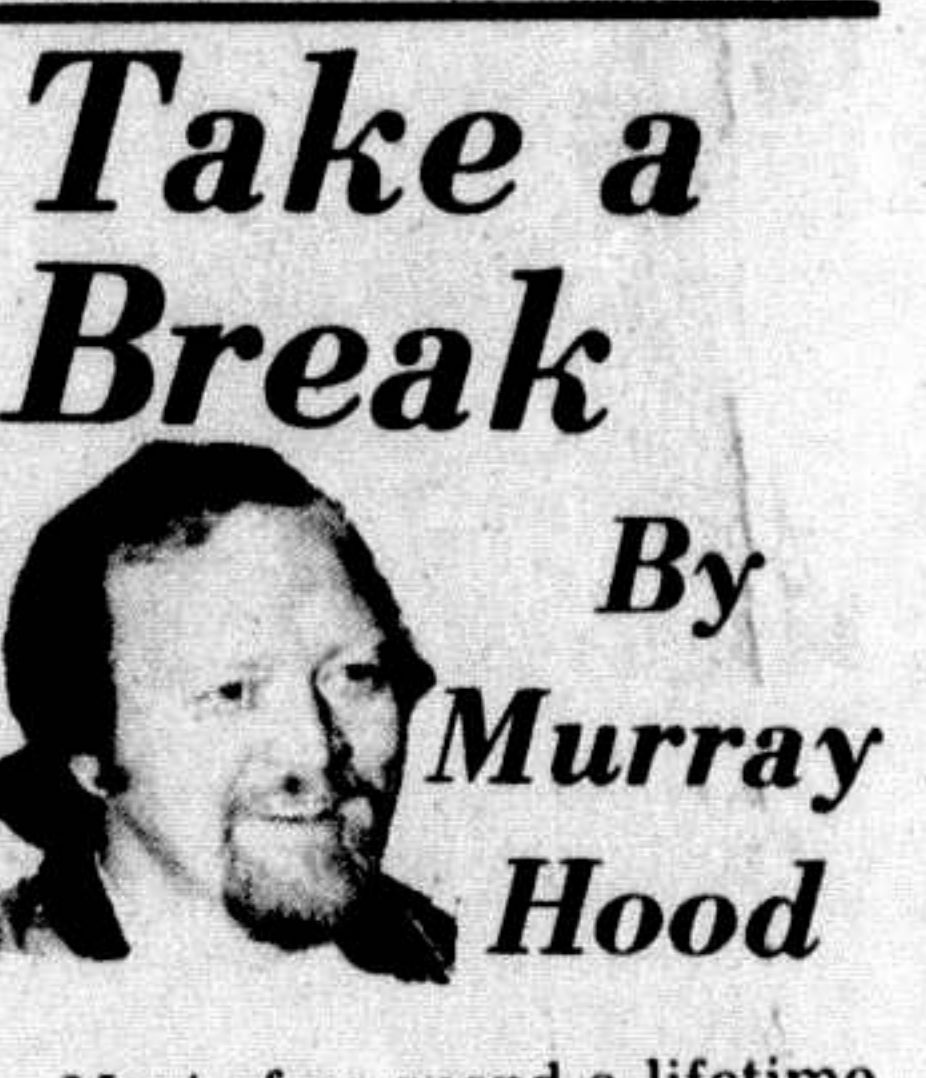
