Stan Chisholm sells bowling alley

After 22 years, ownership of the Milton Bowlway has changed hands. Stan Chisholm has sold his business for the sake of retirement.

Stan's been in the bowling business since 1953 when he was the proprietor of a service station, now the fire hall on Main St., with bowling alleys on the top floor.

Stan purchased the service station business from Dave Brush and the late "Short" Cavell in 1950 and acquired the bowling alley three years later.

The bowling alley and gas station operated side by side until 1957 when the Town of Milton expropriated the service station site for the fire hall. Stan took a year off from

the bowling business that year while he was building his present eight alley building on Main St. at Prince St. Nothing much has changed with the bowling alley since then.

"In some ways," comments Stan, "I don't want to give it up. It's been good, I can't complain." Stan's a life-long Milton resident.

The over 500 bowlers who

patronized Stan as part of organized leagues will begin paying their bowling fees to a new owner this week.

15 years Tony Aggazzino, who's worked with bowling alleys in Port Credit the past 15 years, has purchased the business. Originally from Sicily in Italy, Tony is living in Mississauga but expects to move to Milton.
