

# 40,000 voters . . .

 Liberal finance minister in Ottawa.  
 Liberal Leader Robert Nixon flew into Milton by helicopter last Saturday night to star at an indoor picnic at the Roma Social Club.  
 NDP Leader Stephen Lewis didn't campaign in the riding.  
 Issues which have emerged throughout the debates include housing, deficit spending by Queen's Park, quality of education, in-

flation, regional government as well as the proposed Bradley-Georgetown hydro corridor, and parkway belt and Niagara Escarpment Commission legislation.  
 Regional government is another dandy, and both the Liberal and NDP candidates have said that form of government should be restudied to include such items as having regional chairmen run for their offices.  
**Youngest candidate**  
 Gary Dawkins, the Tory candidate, is at 36 the youngest of the three contestants. He is principal of M. Z. Bennett School in Acton, and is married with two children.  
 Conservative Dawkins supports existing government policy but insists that "I'm my own man and prepared to fight within the confines of my party for what I feel is best for the constituency."  
 "I'm no radical but I'm not a yes man and I never have been."  
 Dawkins has defended the Davis government against charges of having a lack of integrity and using deficit spending.  
 "You can say what you like about government spending, but the government has cut back on the areas of health and education by imposing ceilings. And they have looked at the needs and pumped money into housing."  
**NDP candidate**  
 Tradesman Bill Johnson, eldest of the three candidates at 53, is a stationary engineer at the Domtar Fine Papers Ltd. mill in Georgetown.  
 The rural Nassagaweya resident and father of two children is well-known across North Halton as a combative ratepayer and environmentalist. He is president of the Nassagaweya Ratepayers Association.  
 Johnson says housing is a major issue, and believes "a young couple with a 40-year mortgage around their necks is just as much a slave as a person with a ball and chain around the ankles. And they're the better off ones."  
 He says the Davis government has been doing too much talking and not enough building of homes, and that the high mortgage rates mean more and more persons have to live in apartments.  
 "And this puts their right into the hands of those who gouge you with rents."  
**Liberal rep.**  
 Julian Reed of Norval, got involved in politics via a battle over whether or not Norval School should be closed.  
 He and his supporters survived for three years, but the Halton Board of Education

has now closed the facility.  
 Reed, age 39, is an actor in commercials and a farmer. Reed has advocated a measure popular with many that the Ontario government should compensate landowners for the forceable removal of their rights in special areas like the parkway belt and the Niagara Escarpment.  
 Liberal Reed criticizes the Tory government for never bringing in a balanced budget, and says a Liberal government would move towards financial responsibility.  
 Reed says that under a Liberal administration the people of Ontario could "feel the fresh air of public scrutiny."  
 Says the Liberal: "Tell your friends we're fighting a government arrogant of majority." Reed says his organization has spent an estimated \$13,000 to \$14,000 on the campaign, with as many as 500 persons having worked voluntarily. His headquarters is at the controversial Norval School.  
**Many volunteers**  
 Alec Petrie, campaign manager for New Democrat Bill Johnson, says the party spent \$4,800 on the election in Halton-Burlington riding. More than 50 persons divided into four groups have provided the NDP manpower for the campaign.  
 Fred Dawkins, brother of the Conservative candidate and his campaign manager, was unable Tuesday to estimate Conservative expenditures in the campaign. And the committee finance man, Graeme Goebelle of Georgetown, was out of town.  
 But Dawkins said between 500 and 700 volunteers worked on the Tory effort.  
 Voters this time out will be marking their ballots behind a new, three-sided cardboard screen designed to provide more privacy.  
**Black ballot**  
 The ballot itself is entirely black except for the candidates' names and a white circle next to them. Voters are to mark an X in the white circle opposite the candidate of their choice.  
 Because of provincial law, the party affiliations of the three candidates are not listed on the ballot.  
 So the ballots in Halton-Burlington simply show the names of the candidates in alphabetical order: the ballot lists them as Gary Dawkins, William A. Johnson and Julian Reed.

# Hornby father dies in puzzling crash

An investigation is underway by Halton Regional Police into a puzzling one-car accident Friday which claimed the life of a 58-year-old Hornby father.  
 Constable Dave Eadie of Oakville District said Herbert Roy Coupland of R.R. 2, Hornby was found dead in his overturned vehicle on the Ninth Line, between Highway 401 and Derry Rd. East.  
 He said an Oakville motorist passing by made the discovery.  
 Constable Eadie said an autopsy performed at Milton District Hospital confirmed that Coupland died of injuries sustained in the accident.  
**Seek explanation**  
 But police are still checking the car and looking for witnesses in an effort to explain the incident.  
 The victim was married with two daughters and two sons, and funeral service was held Monday in Milton.  
 Constable Eadie, in charge of the investigation, has urged anyone with information on the accident to contact him by calling 878-5511 and asking for Oakville District.

 Jack Corbett told the committee that the dump would have to be closed unless it meets Ministry of the Environment conditions, and to do that would bump the cost per ton to about \$26. Burlington pays less than \$3 per ton at the Burlington dump.  
**Mayor supports**  
 Milton Mayor Anne MacArthur told the committee all efforts should be made to keep the dump open. "What else do you do for the people? You pave roads for quarry trucks and block communal wells."  
 Committee chairman Jack Raftis said the region had inherited a lot of problems that existed before, but are now blamed on the region.  
 "Don't take your marbles and go home because it doesn't go your way," he said turning to the Mayor and the Milton delegation.  
 "We had a meeting with the Ministry of the Environment on this on Monday and we discussed this problem, but nobody from Milton was there."  
**Not informed**  
 Mayor MacArthur, a member of that committee, chal-

lenged the statement and said the meeting wasn't made up for a month," Raftis said.

**Late voters**  
 Returning Officer Roy Coulter and his staff have received more than 200 phone calls in the last week from potential voters complaining they were not on the voters' list.  
 And the 66-year-old retired farmer is fed up with most of the callers.  
 He said Tuesday that these persons have done nothing in the past month to make sure they were on the list, and all of a sudden they're screaming as election day approaches.  
 Coulter said newspapers and radio and TV stations have been full of advertising explaining the enumeration and revision processes, and news reports throughout the campaign have detailed how the system works.  
 Persons who were missed during visits by enumerators in August had a period between Sept. 5 and 10 to visit special revision offices across the riding to join the voters list. But the list was closed on Sept. 10.  
 He said the enumerators often visited homes two or three times in an effort to register the occupants to vote, but sometimes no one was ever home.  
 Said Coulter: "At least half of the onus is on you. I think the general public has some responsibility if they want to live in a democratic country."

 A resident of the area T. Wilkinson complained bitterly about the proposal, saying the developments would not bring jobs to local people. He claimed industries moving in would bring their own people.  
 "I don't want industry around me. I want to be able to leave my work behind. I don't want to work here."  
 To that the planner said if he had his way, the first thing he would do would be to destroy the automobile. It is the greatest polluter, and the greatest source of accidents, he said. People should be able to live where they work.  
**Opposes new city**  
 Zsadanvi continued his strong opposition to the province's plan to establish a new city in the southern part of Milton where in excess of 2,300 acres has been acquired.  
 He said that by expanding the existing town, accommodating more housing and industry to keep the town on a viable basis made more sense.  
 He sympathized with those who would like to keep things just the way they are now. "We are not going to win, but we might get a sawoff," he said, noting "you can't just close the doors and say 'we don't want you.'"  
 "If my ancestors had said that, you wouldn't be here now."  
 Councillor Russ Powadiuk said the town did not favor the province's plan to put a quarter of a million people in north Oakville and north Burlington.

**138 signs**  
 Make no mistake how Archie Brown is going to vote in the upcoming provincial election.  
 He's voting for New Democrat Bill Johnson and, just so nobody gets the wrong idea, he's posted 138 "Elect Johnson" signs on his house and on his front lawn.  
 Brown contested last federal election representing the NDP in this riding and is presently Johnson's campaign manager.

**Forgotten area**  
 Irma Pohlmann said the people on the Fourth Line are forgotten people. "In three years the taxes on my small house have gone up \$100. All we do is eat dust. We pay more for our phone, more for hydro and more for everything, but we have nothing. We just pay."  
 Council's planning and development study committee instructed the planner to proceed with development of plans and set up hearings for developers and residents of the Scotch Block area as well as the Milton Heights and Peru area.
