

# Kelso running first fishing derby

With an accent on family fishing, Halton Region Conservation Authority will hold its first-ever fishing derby this weekend at Kelso Conservation Area.

The HRCA has stocked Kelso Lake with almost 1,000 fish in addition to the 1,800 rainbow and 4,500 brook trout it stocked just before the opening of fishing season.

Included among the 1,000 fish for the derby are 10 rainbow between 20-24 inches long which will give anglers something big to shoot for.

The derby runs both days over the weekend. It runs from 6 a.m. Saturday to 4 p.m. and then again Sunday from 6 a.m. to 4 p.m. Registration is \$3 for the weekend or \$2 per day. Children under 13 years of age will

fish for half that.

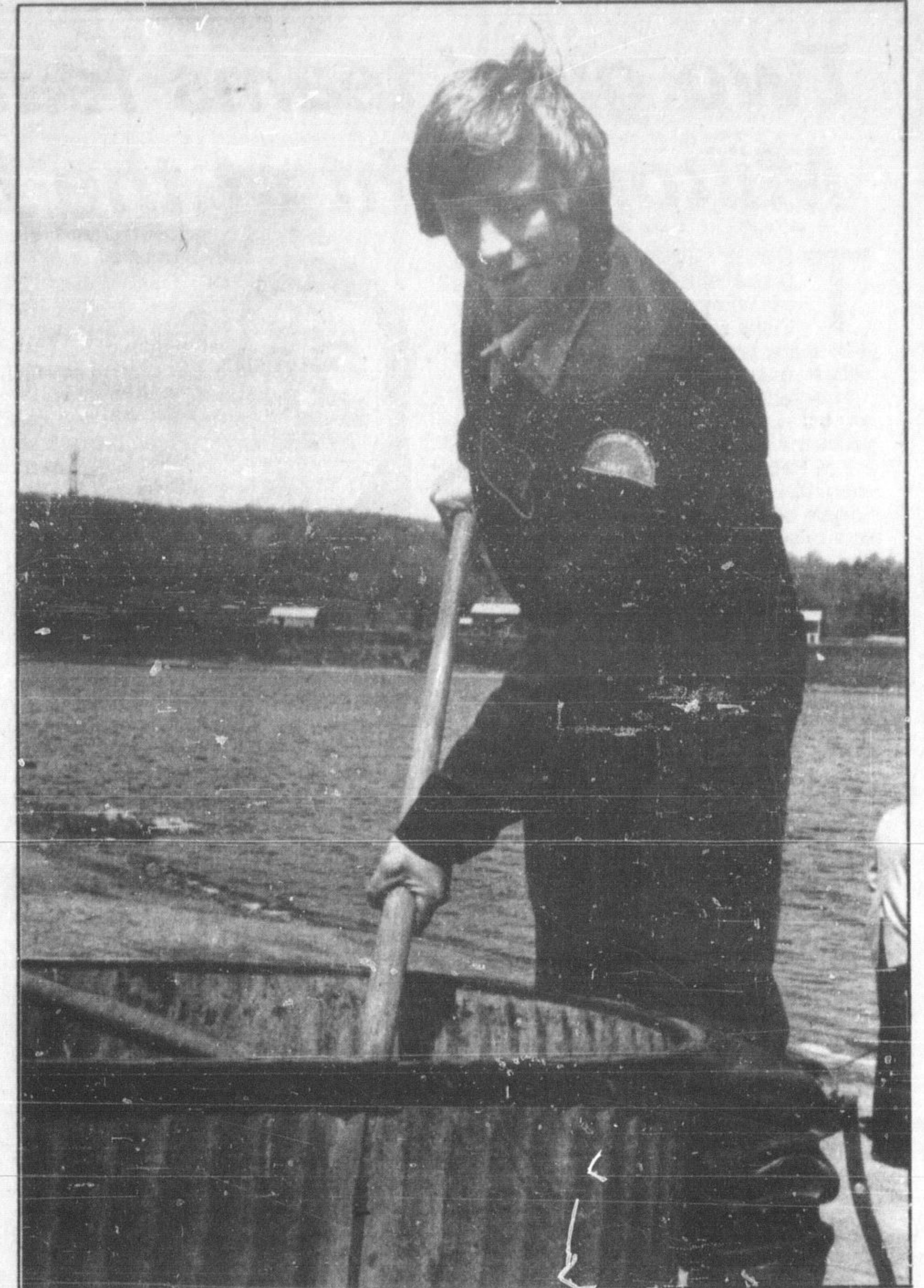
Trophies will be awarded in both adult and children's categories for the longest fish and the best mess of fish. In addition, for children, the smallest trout caught will win a prize. Awards are donated by Molson's Breweries which along with HRCA is co-sponsoring the event.

The Conservation Authority has decided

to stock Kelso in a big way this year after not stocking it last year. The cost of stocking for the derby alone is \$5,600.

For those wishing to make the derby a weekend event, and feel brave enough to challenge the cool nights, camping is available from Friday night to Sunday with food and refreshments available.

## Springers host meet for provincial finals

It won't be long before Milton Springers become a major force in the field of provincial gymnastics.

Starting from scratch just a few years ago, Springers have built a strong club and this year will send two competing gymnasts, Paula Geniole and Susan James, to the provincial championships later this month in Thunder Bay.

The club itself has acquired a good reputation and was chosen to hold the provincial championships for two divisions at E.C. Drury School over the weekend.

Although Springers didn't qualify a competitor through three regional meets for the championships here, the club hosted 112 gymnasts from all over the province as well as 450 officials, judges and spectators Saturday.

The events were for the novice and junior divisions for both men and women.

In the Junior A division, the top level of gymnastics in the province, Robert Dixon, of York University, finished first on the men's side followed by Chris Gabe of Ottawa and Paul Renfrew of Bellington.

On the women's side, Kelly Nesbitt of Oshawa, took the overall title. Oakville's Joyce Moore (see page B3) and Mississauga's Tammy Williams tied for second.

Springers' Geniole and James are busy preparing for Thunder Bay. The pair will compete in the Tyro B category after finishing one-two at the regional meets. In addition, Kerry Horn was selected as an alternate to the Argo B group after finishing seventh overall after the three regional meets.

## Hockey meeting Tuesday

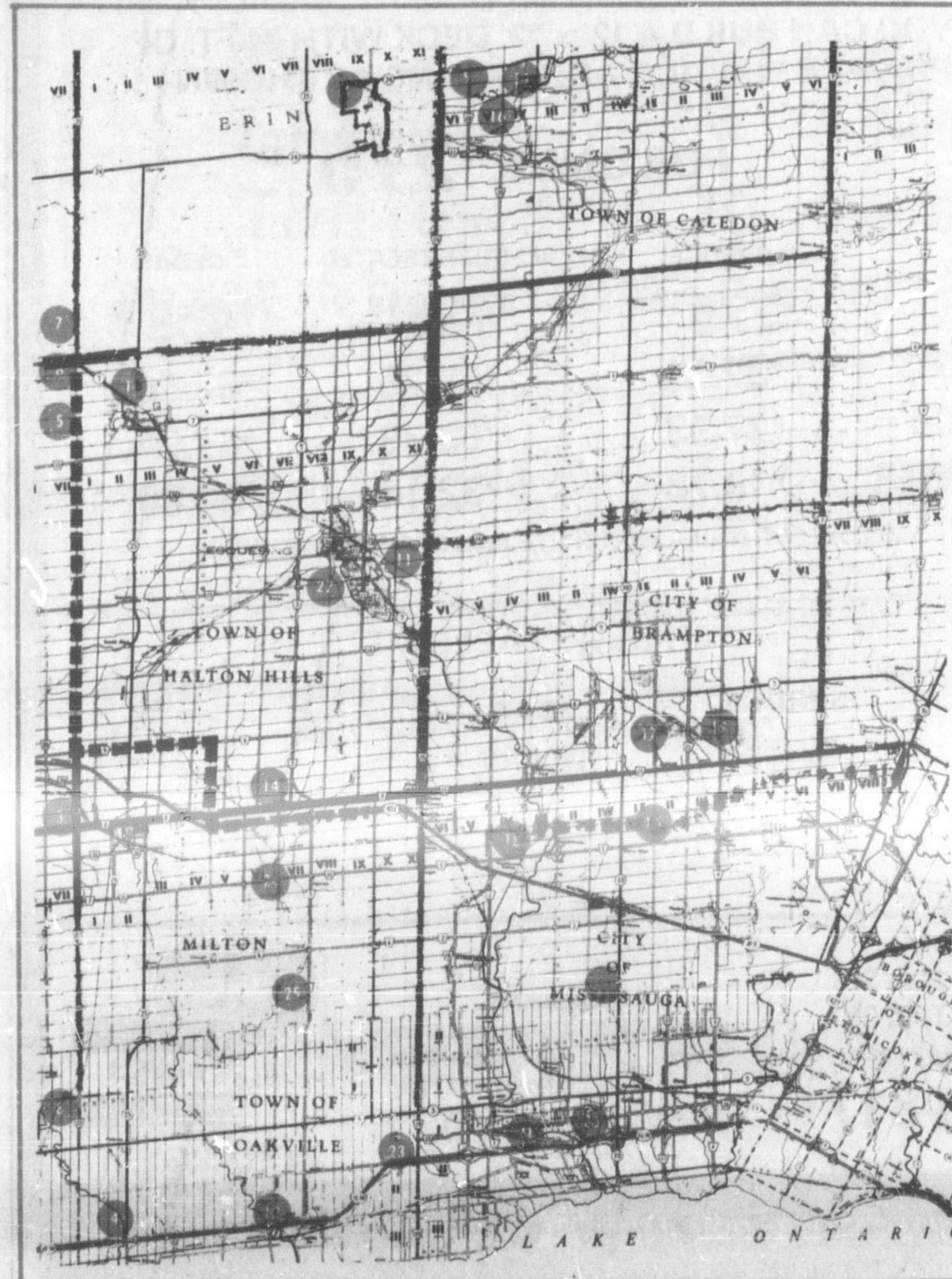
With the position of president open, this year's annual general meeting of Milton Minor Hockey promises to be very interesting.

# Halton guide to golf



Spring is when a young man's fancy turns to greens.

Golfing greens that is. And with the coming of warmer weather, golfers will be out in full force.

Golf enthusiasts in North Halton have many challenging courses to choose from. In Southern Ontario alone there are 200 courses and more than 25 within a short driving distance.

So get out those irons because here's North Halton's guide to golf:

1. Acton Meadows: a 2,936 yard, nine hole golf course with a par 35. It's located on the first line west of Acton. A semi-private course, green fees are \$6 during the week and \$7 on the weekends. 853-0631.
2. Erin Heights: a nine-hole semi-private course located off Highway 24 in Erin. The Heights is a 3,050 yard, with par 36. 877-2286.
3. Halton Heights: located north of Highway 401, this nine hole, 2,945 yard course is par 35. It's on the Milton sixth line. 878-6701.
4. Richview: a long, 6,550 yard, 18-hole course with a par 72. Located in Oakville on Highway 25 between the Dundas Highway and Queen Elizabeth. 827-1211.
5. Victoria Park on Victoria Road in Guelph, is a 36-hole course with 18 holes East and 18 West. A semi-private course, East has a par of 71 and measures 6,397 while West is at par 61, at 3,610 yards. 824-9639.
6. Cutten Club: one of the areas private clubs located at 190 College Street in Guelph. Cutten is an 18-hole, 6,243 yard par 71. 824-2650.
7. Guelph Golf: a nine-hole private course located on Waverly Road in Guelph. The par for the nine is 35 over 3,027 yards. 824-2741.
8. Indian Wells: located on Walkers Line in Burlington. An 18-hole par 71 course. The private course with 6,465 yards. 335-2955.
9. Bolton Golf is a semi-private course located three miles north of Bolton on Highway 50. The 27-hole par 72 course is over 5,800 yards. 857-2050.
10. Derrydale: a public course located at the northeast corner of Highway 10 and Derry Road. It's an 18-hole course over 4,800 yards. 457-2024.
11. Georgetown Golf: a tough 6,396 course located on Sideroad 17 and the Tenth Line. The 18-hole course is semi-private par 71. 877-6011.
12. Glen Abbey: the permanent home of the Canadian Open, designed by golfing great Jack Nicklaus. It's a semi-private course over a rolling 7,133 yards for gold, blue 6,604, white 6,194 and ladies 5,579 yards. The 18-hole par 72 course is located on the North Service Road in Oakville, between Dorval Drive and Fourth Line. 844-1800.
13. Glen Eagle: another Bolton-area course, located on Highway 50, six miles north of town. The semi-private establishment is 18-hole, par 72 over 6,300 yards of fairways, greens and tees. 925-0511.
14. Hornby Tower: a public course located north of Highway 401 in Hornby. A long 18-holes measures 6,700 yards with par 72. 878-3421.
15. Lido Golf: on the South Service Road

and Bronte Road in Oakville. A semi-private par 63 course has 18-holes; a driving range and 18-hole miniature course. 827-1062.

16. Orangeville Golf: semi-private course two miles south of Orangeville. The nine-hole course has a green fee of \$6 during the week and \$8 on weekends. The course is 3,000 yards, par 35. 941-4727.

17. Peel Village: public nine-hole course on the east side of Highway 10, two miles south of Highway 7. The course is par 35 and is 3,065 yards in length. 457-4511.

18. Streetsville: Glen: semi-private course on the east side of Mississauga Road. The 18-hole, 6,561 yard has a par of 72. 451-9324.

19. Brampton Golf: a private course located on the First Line east of Highway 10, Brampton is an 18-hole course with a par of 71 and runs 7,010 yards. 457-5700.

20. Credit Valley: private course south of Highway 5, one mile west of Highway 10. Credit Valley is an 18-hole par 71 course running 5,610 yards. 277-9469.

21. Mississauga Golf: a private, 18-hole par 72 course runs 6,436 yards. It's found on the east side of the Mississauga Road, north of Queen Elizabeth Way. 278-5255.

22. North Halton Golf and Country Club: private club, at the corner of Trafalgar Road and Maple Avenue in Georgetown. The 18-hole course measures 6,374 yards and has par 72. 877-9901.

23. Oakville Golf: nine-hole private course on the Sixth Line of Trafalgar. The course measures 6,210 yards for men at

par 71, and 5,920 yards at par 73 for women. 845-8321.

24. Trafalgar Golf: a private club on the Sixth Concession and Derry Road in Milton. The 18-hole, 6,505 yard course has par 71. 878-2303.

25. Wyldewood: located on Trafalgar Road in Hornby is another private club with 18 holes. Wyldewood is 6,214 yard par 70 course. 878-4848.

26. Hawthorne Valley: all par three course located on Highway 10 south of the 401 in Mississauga. The par 56 course is 2,000 yards long, plus miniature. 277-0848.

27. Nobleton Lakes: north of Nobleton on Highway 27 east along Sideroad 16, this 18-hole course over 6,900 yards is par 72. 859-4070.

28. Oakville-Mississauga: on Fourth Line at the Dundas Highway this nine-hole par three, 1,870 yard course also includes a driving range. 845-0045.

29. Golf 10—On Highway 10 between 401 and Eglinton, this is a short or "executive" course. 279-1804.

30. Chinguacousy: North of Brampton and west of Highway 10 on 34 Sideroad this 18-hole, 6,235 yard, par 72 course is private. Nine holes has 2,600 yards par 34. 838-3903.

31. Golfland: located on Highway Six, north of Clappison's Corners, this executive-size course features 18 holes with a par 59.

32. Hidden Lake Golf and Country Club: on the Number 1 Sideroad in Burlington, Hidden Lake is a public course consisting of 18-holes with a par 72. 336-3660.
