Scotch Block channel improvement underway

Improved flood protection, reduced erosion and more stable water supplies are the three major benefits expected to result from a recently approved channel improvement project in the Town of Halton Hills.

The project, which will be undertaken by the Halton Region Conservation Authority, will concentrate on a 430 metre section of the Sixteen Mile Creek downstream of the Scotch Block Dam and Reservoir to the culvert at Highway 25.

In approving the project, Alan W. Pope, Minister of Natural Resources stated that this section of the Sixteen Mile Creek has been the

subject of considerable erosion since the Scotch Block Dam and Reservoir were constructed in 1969.

Discharges from the dam have exceeded the capacity of the existing channel and have resulted in flooding and erosion downstream. In addition, the creek meanders considerably throughout this section, thereby creating a threat that water supplies for irrigation may be interrupted.

Mr. Pope also noted that the proposed measures have been designed by the Conservation Authority to minimize disturbance of the environment through maintenance of the

natural vegetation.

The project, whose estimated cost is \$161,000, will be aided by a provincial grant of \$88,550.

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
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
