HIGH-SCHOOL ATHLETES spent yesterday competing in the Peel-Halton track and field championships at Etobicoke's Centennial Stadium.

Among the athletes competing were Ian James, Dan Jaggart, Simone Carnegie and Lee-Anne Macdonald from E.C. Drury High School.

The four advanced to the Peel-Halton championships by qualifying through the Halton championships last week.

James is the reigning provincial champion in the long jump and triple jump. Last week, he set a Canadian high-school record of 15.34 metres in the triple jump but the record won't stand because there was no gauge to test the wind velocity.

Jaggart qualified in the shot put for senior boys, Carnegie qualified in midget girls' long jump and Macdonald qualified for both the 800 and 1500 metres junior girls' races.

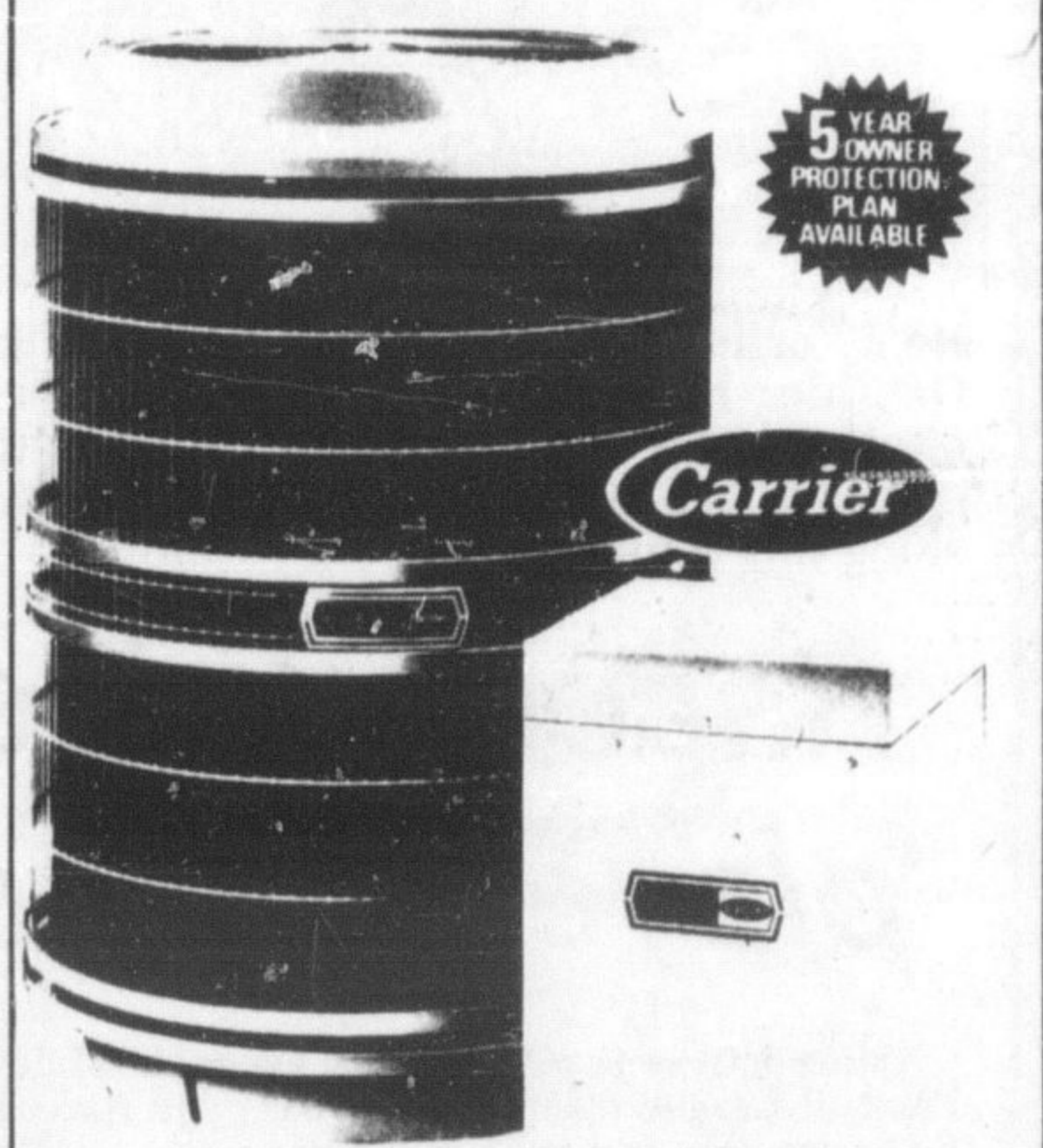

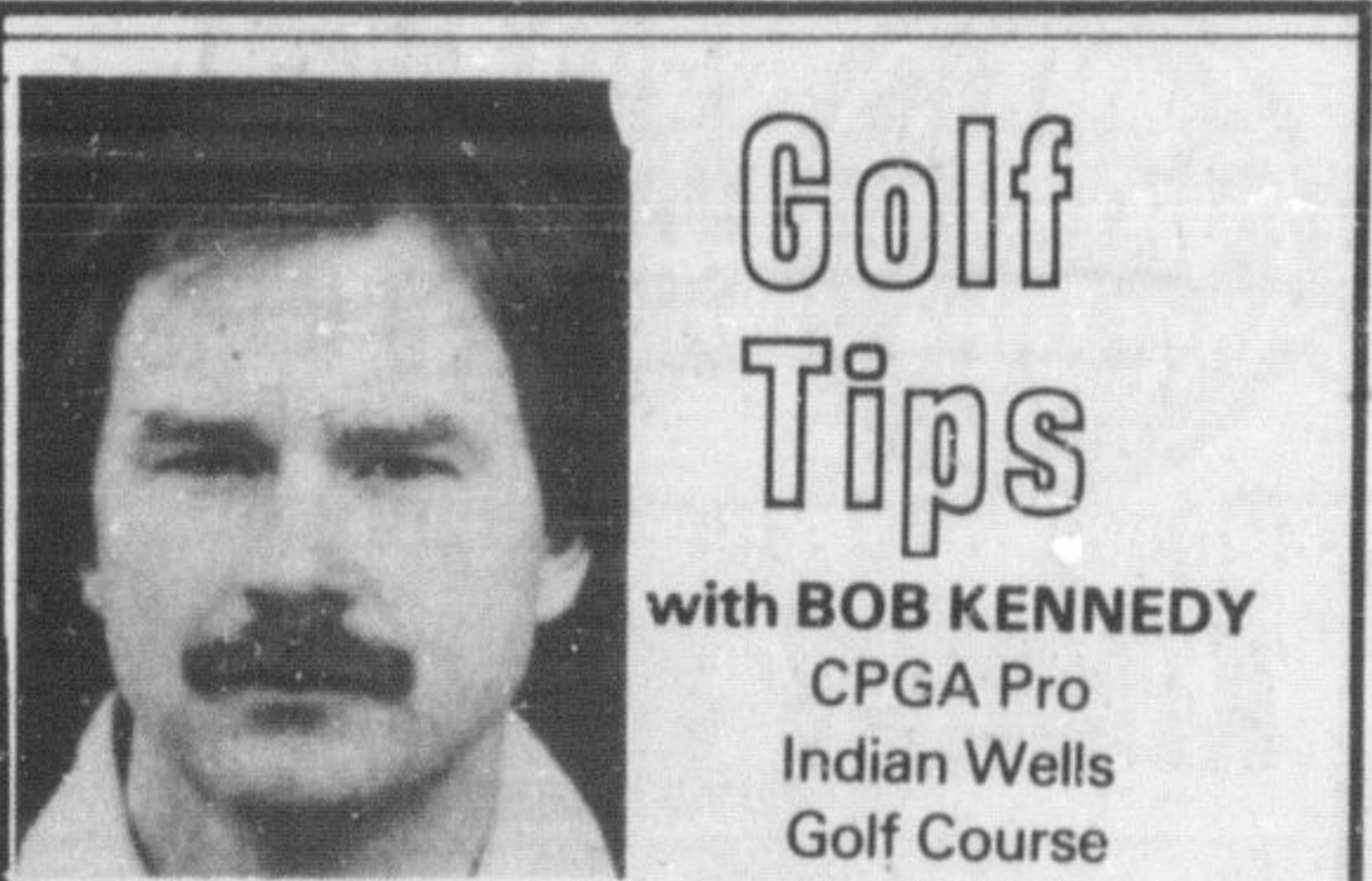

Greensmanship

Golfers break more rules on the putting green than in any other sector of the game. Knowing putting rules can help you win. Here is a presentation of some of the rules in a simple can and can't form.

Hitting The Flagstick

—you CAN hit the unattended flagstick without penalty from anywhere OFF the putting surface.
—you CAN'T hit the flagstick from a spot on the putting surface if you choose to have your opponent or his caddie attend the flagstick—you become responsible for his action. you are penalized if your ball strikes the flagstick, not the opposing side.

Putting Stance

—you CAN place yourself either side of the ball to putt and use whatever grip and stance you prefer.
—you CAN'T make a stroke from a stance astride the line of putt or an extension of it behind the ball. nor with either foot touching the line of putt.

Lifting & Cleaning Ball

—you CAN lift and clean your ball, replacing it on the spot where it rested, at anytime after it has reached the green.
—you CAN'T in match play refuse to replace your ball after cleaning it, if your opponent so requests.

Water study

Halton Regional Council has temporarily deferred Milton Council's Jan. 19 approval of the Campbellville Secondary Plan.

The approval of the plan by Halton will be held up while a "comprehensive" hydrogeological study is done to find out if the water and sewage capacity can accommodate a planned subdivision.

In the meantime, development will be allowed in Campbellville as long as what is built does not require water or sewer service.

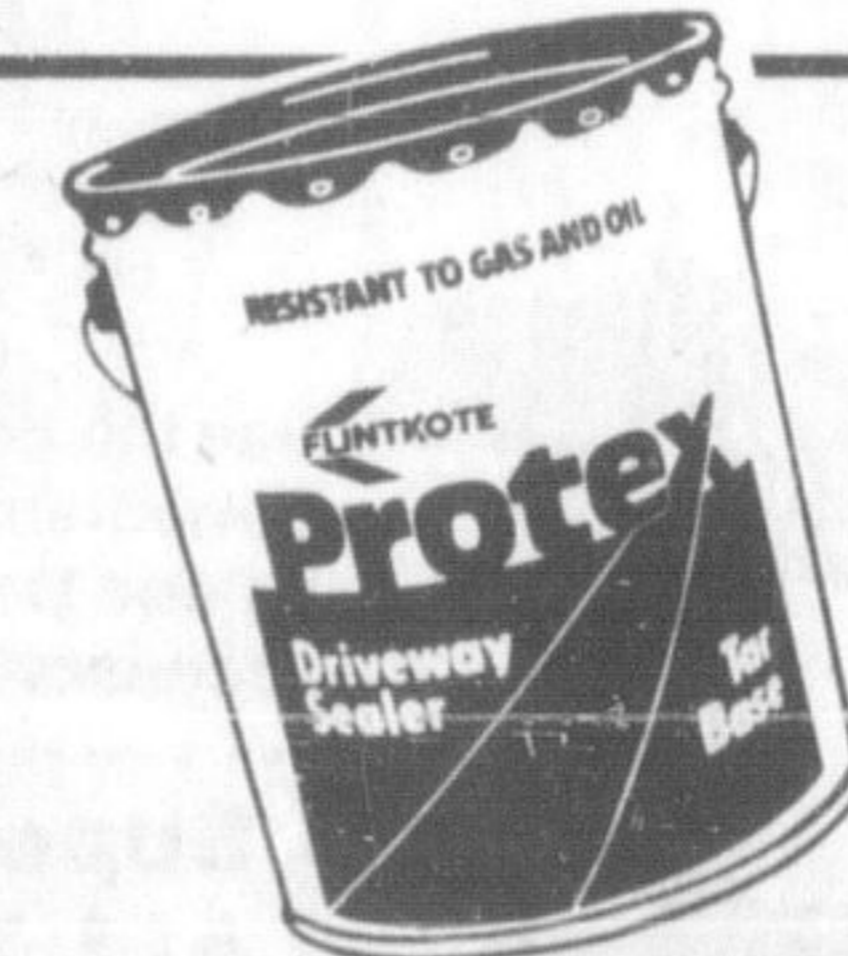

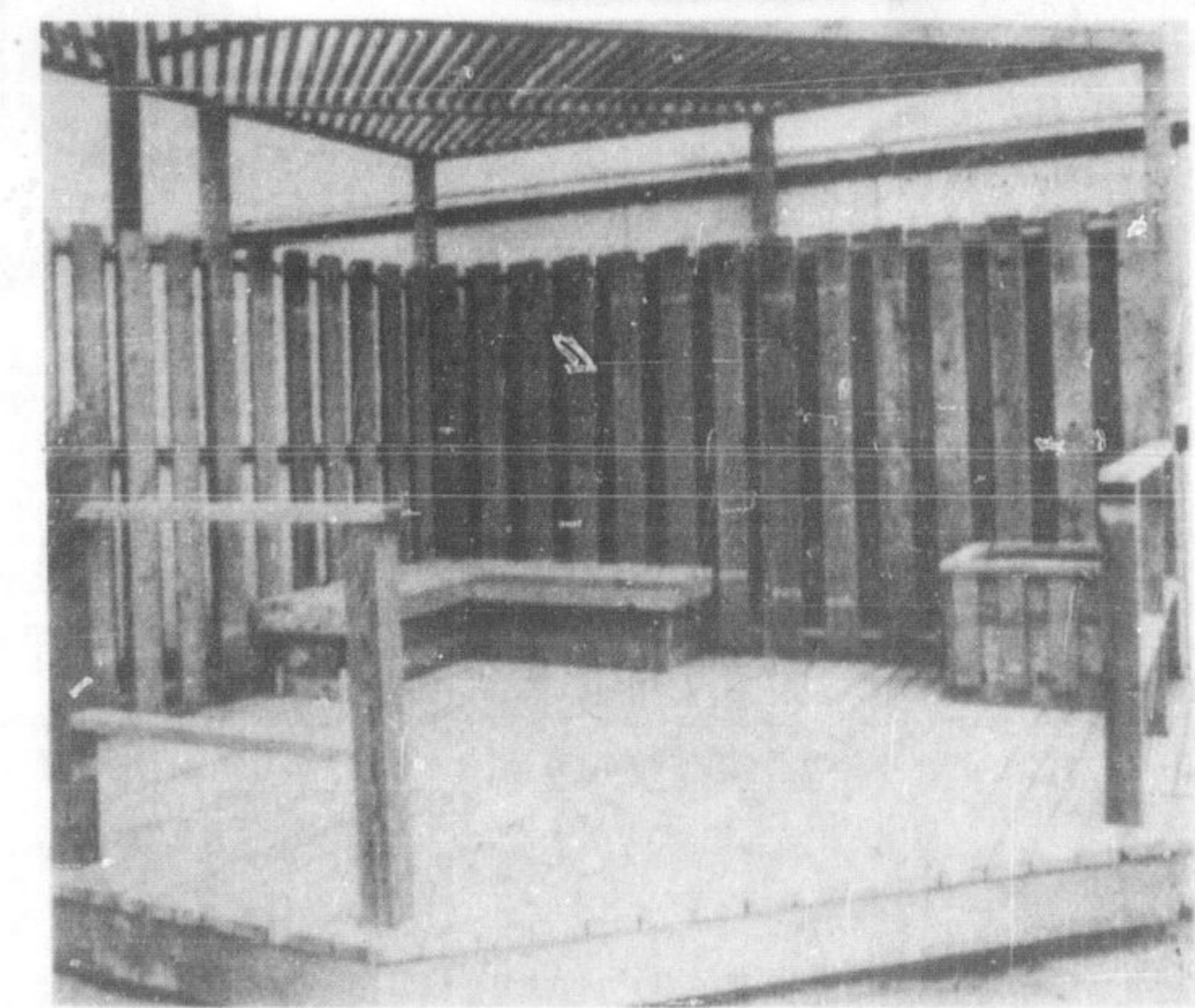

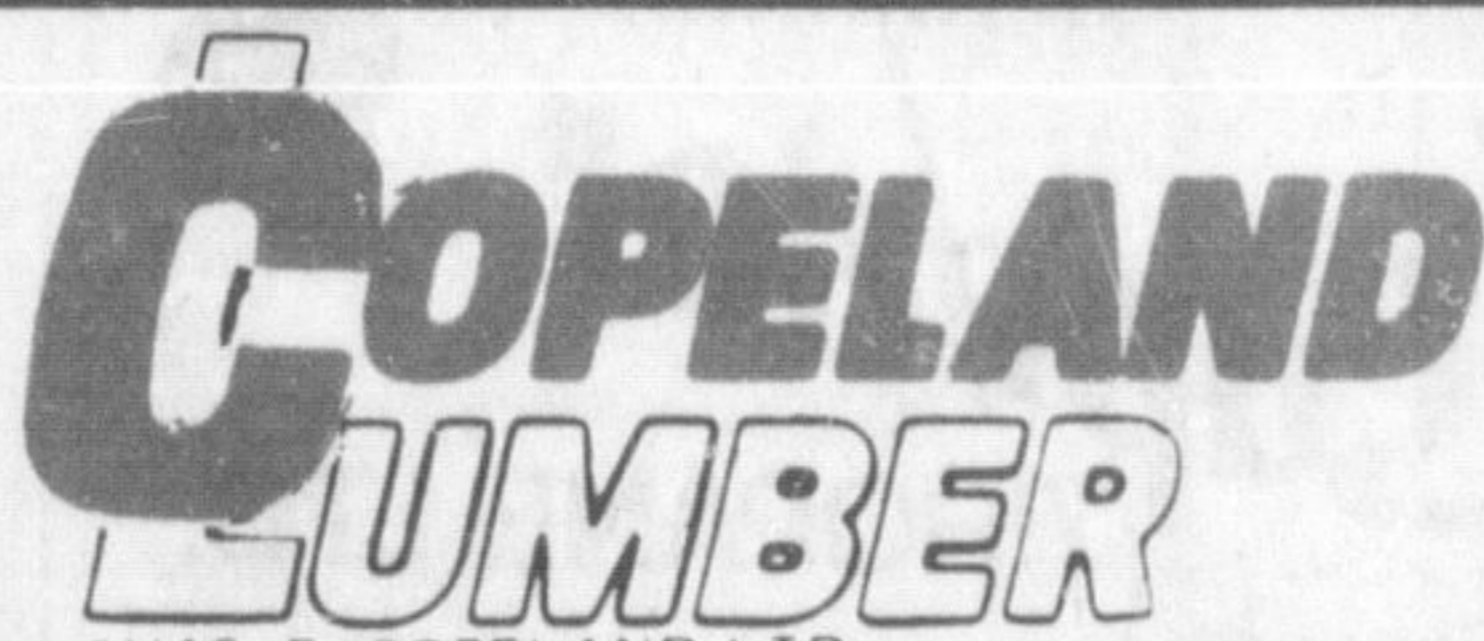
