

## Council Manor walk can start soon

A walkway for students between the Milton Mall and E. C. Drury High School may be started "in the next month or so" according to Milton Deputy Clerk Bill Roberts.

Mr. Roberts reported staff had been instructed to look into the cost of creating the walkway after Halton Region agreed to an easement across the property of Halton Centennial Manor.

The Manor had complained that students were taking short cuts across the Manor property to get to school. Students were also walking along the east side curb area of Highway 25 to get to school where there is no sidewalk.

Mr. Roberts said in order to get the sidewalk through, two purchases of land will be needed.

The path through the Manor property can be purchased for \$3 from Halton but the province of Ontario wants \$200 for its portion.

Nevertheless, Mr. Roberts said that should the council decide to spend the money the town's legal firm will prepare the necessary licence agreements "which will be presented to Council for execution as soon as it is completed."

"It is expected that the property acquisition will be finalized in the next month or so, after which time construction of the sidewalk could be started."

## Quarry hopes pass NEC

Claude Warren, whose plans to rehabilitate an abandoned quarry seemed dashed earlier in the year, has won a decision to go ahead.

Mr. Warren had purchased the Barnes quarry lands north of Campbellville Sideroad at Sixth Line with the idea of damming up the quarry for a lake and landscaping the spot to return it to its former beauty.

While Regional Councillor Brad Clements said he was happy that someone would try to rehabilitate the "eyesore quarry", the Halton Planning Department was opposed to the idea, as were a few area farmers.

The region was against the land being redeveloped as it lies in an "agricultural" zoning area and therefore any changes would have to be agriculturally oriented.

As Mr. Warren had simply planned to develop the area as a home for his family, the region remained opposed.

But now Milton Council has been informed Mr. Warren has applied to and been given permission by the Niagara Escarpment Commission to "rehabilitate an abandoned quarry to agricultural use, as grassland."

It is not known what the next move of the region will be.

## Spring clean-up dates announced

The annual Milton spring clean-up program will be held on two Fridays, May 22 and May 29.

Public Works Director John Matthews said the change to the four day garbage collection cycle makes Fridays available for special garbage collection.

"By conducting our clean-up on Fridays a considerable saving in labor charges will be realized," he said.

The spring cleanup dates are to be advertised with "emphases on the change of day" for two weeks prior to the collection days.

## Condominium approval shifts

Council has been informed that as of May 15, Halton Region will take over the power of approval of condominiums from the Ontario Ministry of Housing.

The decision to delegate approval of condominiums to Halton has been announced by Minister Claude Bennett and will affect only new condominiums registered after May 15.

All condominiums registered prior to that date will still be processed by the Ministry of Housing.

The circus will be coming to town May 21.

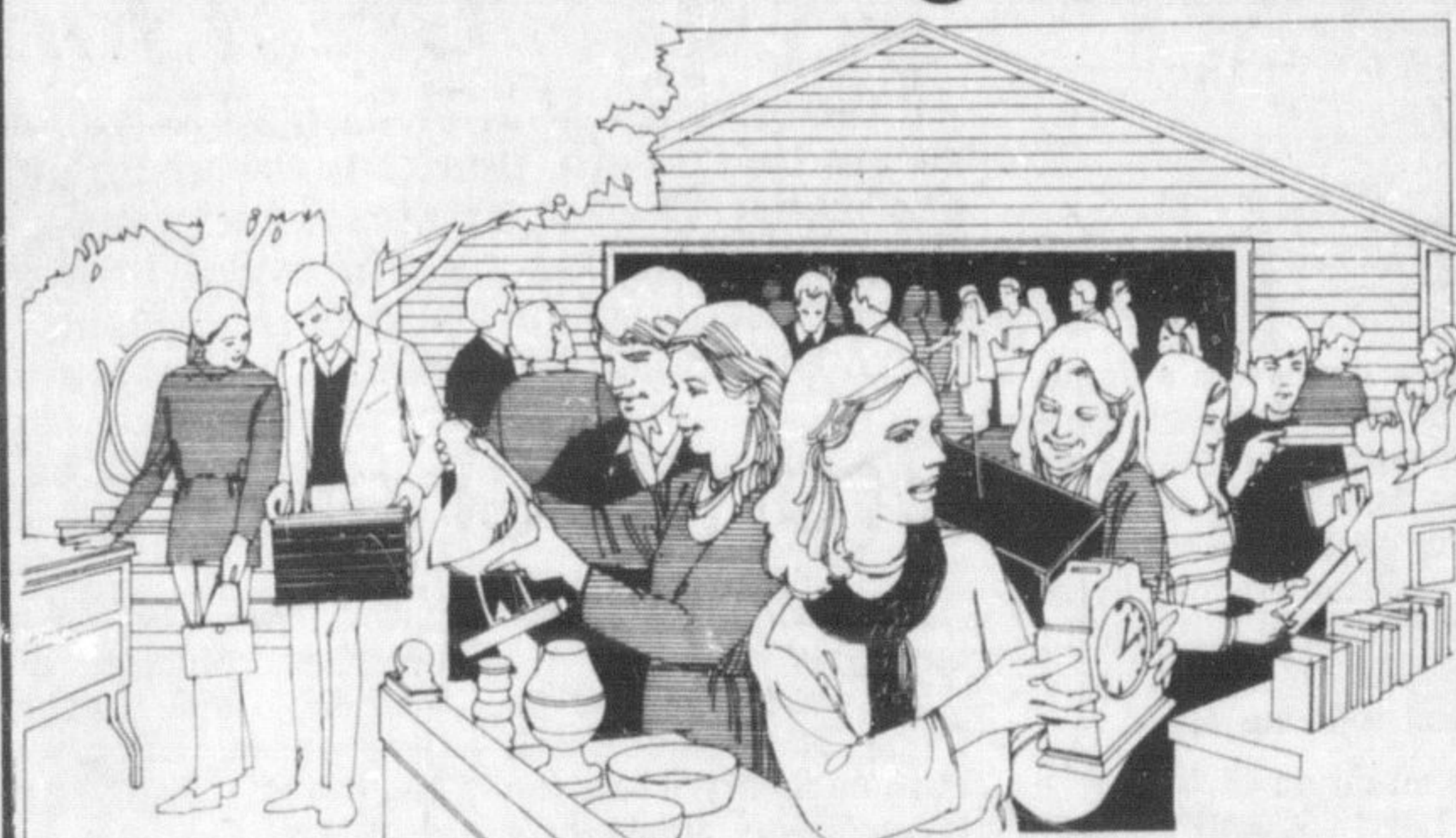
Milton Council has approved a request by the Milton Optimist Club to have the Martin and Downs Circus use the Milton Fairgrounds on that day.
