Halton will continue to negotiate with the Halton Aggregate Producers Group over prime gravel areas in the Halton Official Plan the region wants to protect from quarry extraction.

The aggregate group has objected to a number of conditions of the official plan and is considered not to be in favor with some subsequent minor changes in it presented by the planning staff.

The aggregate industry is on record as supporting the concept of taking gravel and road building materials from the Halton area as it is close the Metropolitan Toronto area where most of the work is being done. Milton is considered one of the prime locations

for pit and quarry extraction. Regional Council has

supported a recommendation that the planning staff continue discussion with the aggregate group of Halton and report back on "preferred modifications to the regional plan" to the Planning and Public Works Committee.
