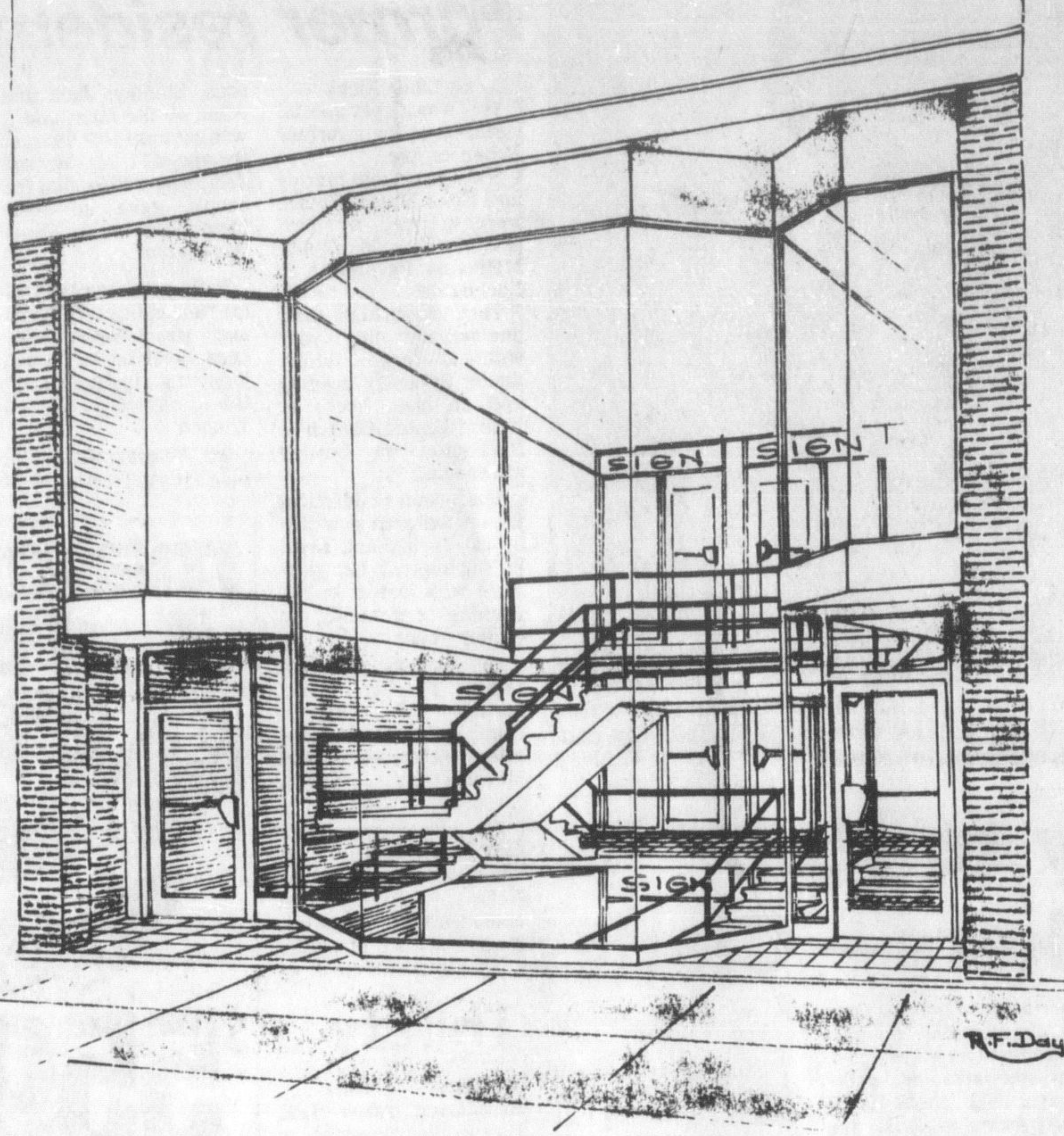
The roll call was answered with the name of a place enjoyed, and why. Mrs. Lyle Poole introduced her guests.

A class of mature cows was then judged, reasons given, and official placements given.

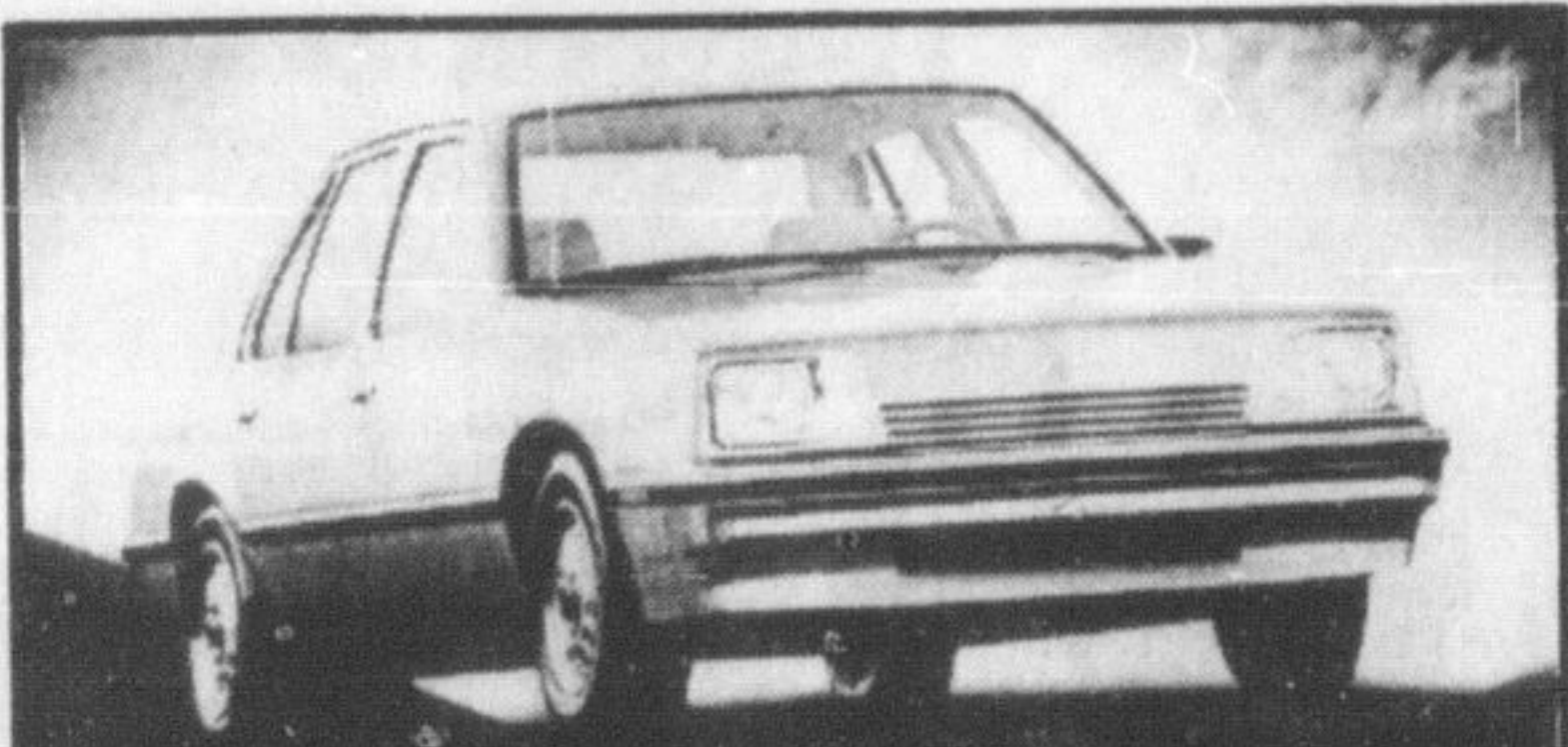
A booklet on the "Digestion of the Beef and Dairy Animal" was given out.
