

No referees available for unregistered teams



Soccer talk
with JOHN MORGAN

It must be Squirt Week in Milton. John Saunders and Danny Cameron were thrilled with the performance of their Misco Data reps in the Robbie tournament. After weeks of frustration the boys saved up their first win of the season for the occasion of the big tournament, as they knocked off Markham 2-1 in the opening game and followed that with an impressive performance against North York Cosmos.

On Sunday Neil Platts' Jaycees squirt girls house league team travelled to Mississauga for a first round Peel Halton Soccer Bowl '81 game against the Mississauga Soccer Club's Soccer Unlimited and came home 4-2 winners. The Jaycees came up with an aggressive attacking game to beat the stronger Mississauga team and advance to the second round where they will be at home to Brams United's Robin's Angels.

Dave Thompson got after me the other day to know what could be done about getting officials for the Dickens games.

The Dickens have a "social" team which does not play in any league but arranges friendly games with similar teams. As such they are not registered with the Peel Halton Soccer Association.

Referees registered with the Ontario Soccer Association are only allowed to officiate in leagues approved by the O.S.A. Leagues made up of teams which are affiliated with the O.S.A. through their district association. Every referee is issued with a list of approved leagues and risks suspension for officiating at other games. There is no provision for teams such as the Dickens which do not belong to any league.

The reason that the O.S.A. restricts registered referees to approved leagues is two-fold. Firstly, the O.S.A. spends a considerable amount each year on referee development and it is only fair that those clubs which contribute to the O.S.A. funds, through their affiliation fees, should benefit from this development. Secondly, there have been considerable problems in the past with players who have been suspended for misconduct, particularly referee assault, who continue to play in unregistered leagues.

As an administrator I have to say that if the Dickens team wants the benefits of organized soccer, in the form of registered referees, then they

should become part of organized soccer. However, having said that, I must admit that there does not, at present, appear to be a slot for them. One of the problems being that a player may only play for one team at the recreational level and I believe that some of the Dickens team also play for, and are registered with teams in the Intercounty League.

Perhaps a new category, say Social Teams, should be introduced to cater for teams such as the Dickens. They could pay a moderate affiliation fee which would contribute to development funds and their players would be subject to the same disciplinary action as any other team.

However, this does not help the Dickens with their current problem. The O.S.A. directive to referees prohibits them from officiating in unregistered leagues but says nothing about individual friendly games. There are meetings of both the P.H.S.A. executive and the Milton branch of the Ontario Referees Association scheduled for this week and I will be taking this matter up with both bodies to see if an amicable solution can be devised.

Talking of referees, several have mentioned to me how much they enjoy refereeing the girls' games. The teams are always ready to play at the appointed time, play with enthusiasm and respect the official's decisions without question. On the other hand too many of the boys' teams seem to think that the published time is the time that they turn up at the field and they are invariably five or ten minutes late kicking off.

Remember the Blizzard Clinic when Julius Sono and Dave McQueen came to Milton? Well, MYSC has been invited to a clinic at Exhibition Stadium next Sunday morning, July 5. Those attending will take part in a clinic similar to the one held in Milton and then watch the Blizzard play the Jacksonville Tea Men in the afternoon. The Milton party will be limited to 50 and is filling up fast, but you may still be in time if you call Cheryl Wakely at 878-7493. The cost is \$7 each (\$3.50 for the game ticket and \$3.50 for the bus).

The Cosmos are coming. Next Wednesday, July 8, the New York Cosmos are coming to Exhibition Stadium for a game against the Blizzard. The Cosmos are the top team in the North American Soccer League and the Blizzard always seems to come up with a good game when they meet, so it should be quite a show.

Cheryl Wakely is organizing buses for the game which will leave Milton at 6.15 p.m. Cost is \$7 per person, \$3.50 for the bus and \$3.50 for the game ticket. Call Cheryl, at the number above, before Sunday evening to reserve your seat.
