Caretakers sign pact

A two-year agreement calling for increases of 11.7 and 10.92 per cent has been signed between the full-time caretakers and the Halton Board of Education.

The board agreed to the contract at a recent meeting and it took effect July 1. Wage increases are 90 cents this year and 95 cents in 1982, across the board.

The contract also calls for another holiday, Heritage Day, if and when the federal government declares it a statutory holiday. Vacations will increase

to four weeks with 10 years experience, five weeks after 19 years and six weeks after 27 years. The agreement covers 230 members of the Canadian Union of

Public Employees, local 1011.

In another decision the board agreed to increase to \$18 per hour for continuing education teachers who live in Halton. Teachers from outside of Halton will receive \$17.73 and experienced teachers without a teaching certificate will get \$16.12 and those without experience will get \$15.08 per hour.

Region has 40 jobs

There are 40 positions vacant and available at Halton Region.

Personnel Director Dennis Camm reported the number of positions range from three in the Chief Administrator's office to 16 in the Health Department.

Halton has a budget to employ 675 full-time and 24 part-time personnel.

Mr. Camm said there are several senior positions now open which are being advertised internally and externally.

The positions are: Administrative Assistant to the Chief Administrator; Manager of Accounting and Systems; Solicitor; Administrator, Halton Centennial Manor; Director of Social Services; Manager of Children's Services; Manager of Administrative Service, Health; and Manager of Solid Waste.

"A number of jobs in the general work force of Public Works remain open and unfilled because of budget restraints in that department," Mr. Camm said.
