## Better go deep for the fish

**A**S I WRITE THIS, the temperature in the shade is 89 degrees F. So if you plan to go fishing, you will have to go deep.

There are only a few fish which like water above 57 degrees F and they are carp, minnows, catfish, perch and sunfish. Even bass will go a little deeper when the water temperature goes above 57 degrees F.

Norman Coulter, popular owner of North End Datsun in Milton, took his crew on our annual fishing trip to Spider Lake in the Parry Sound District. To go on this trip, you must be in fairly good physical condition.

We landed at Three-Legged Lake, unloaded the boats and motors, food, thirst quenchers, sleeping bags, etc., then went across Three-Legged Lake to the portage which takes you overland to Spider Lake. This portage is just half a mile long but it goes in two ways — straight up and straight down.

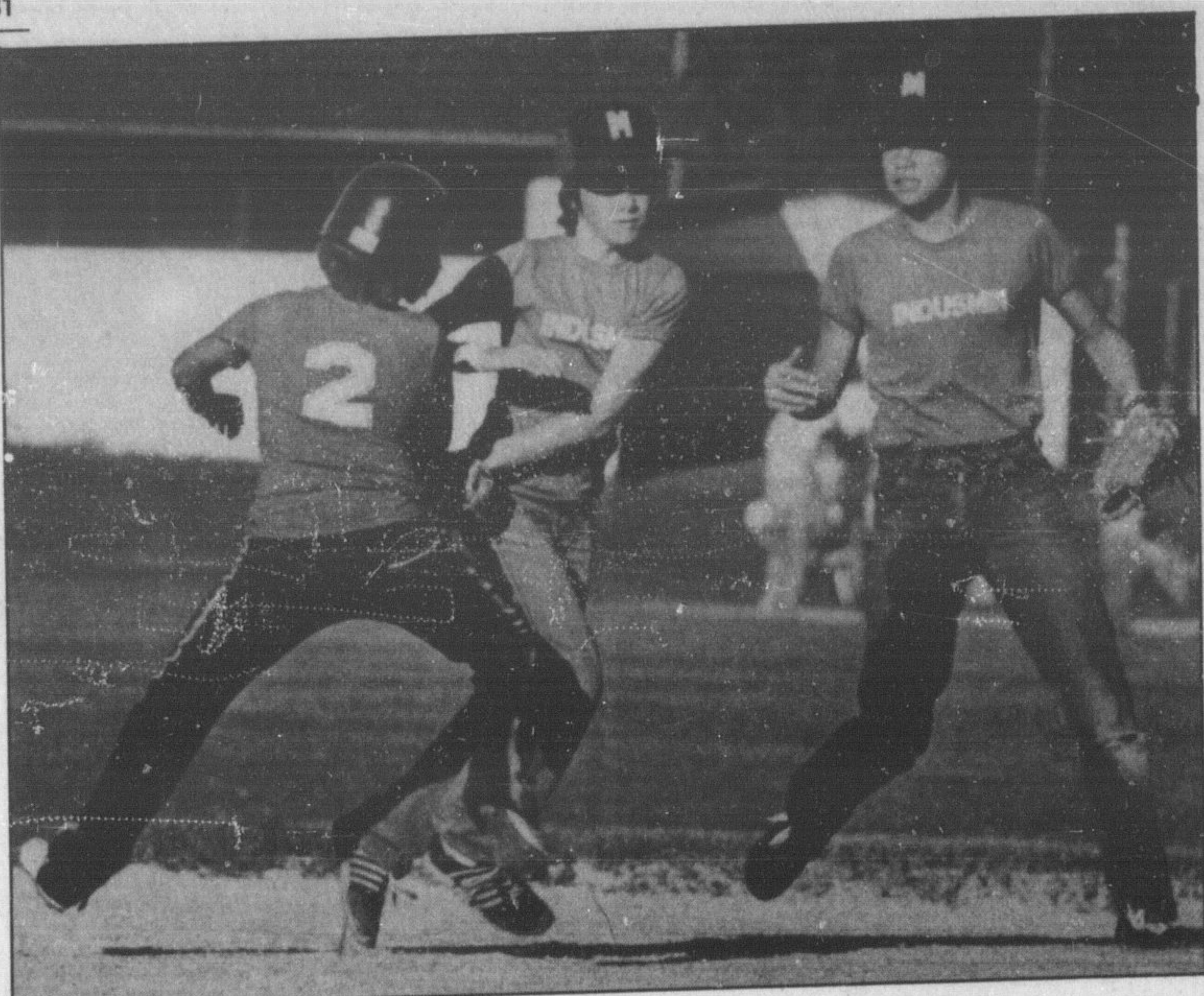




