Grade 13 end is rejected

A proposal to eliminate Grade 13 has been rejected by the Halton Board of Education in its response to the Special Education Review Project (SERP).

Chairman of the board's SERP com-

mittee, Bill Priestner, noted that eliminating Grade 13 will actually cost the educational system more money than it would save.

He pointed out that SERP recommendations to increase the number of

diploma credits to 30 from 27 and to increase Grade 13 will actually result in increased costs, not a savings as many would like to believe.

The board is also against the proposal because it feels the extra year of high school is necessary to mature the student and that the emphasis in the school system towards university-bound students should be reduced.

"I think we have so small a percentage of the children going on to universities and that's the crime of it, that so much of the funding goes toward these students," said Oakville trustee Jackie Cutmore.

The board is concerned that compressing the curriculum into a shorter time will take away money and other

resources from efforts to solve the problems general-level students who are in need of skills that are suitable for the workplace and community college, she said.

These resources may be assigned to the reorganization of the curriculum at all levels.

Secondly, the board is concerned the redesign of the advanced-level curricula might get an even higher priority than it now receives even though this is one area where a problem doesn't exist.

As a minor consideration, if a four-year program is adopted students should not be accelerated because they would enter post-secondary institutions at a very early age which may cause some adjustment difficulties.

Bronte camping site being sought

A good location must be found before overnight camping is established in the Bronte Creek Provincial Park area, says a government official.

The service is coming, but it will be about five years before it's operating, said Gordon Rogers of the Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources central district.

"We've had some second thoughts favoring camping in the park," said Rogers, acting parks co-ordinator for the district.

"Some type of camping development near Bronte Creek is necessary," he added.

Both the Burlington and Oakville Chambers of Commerce are pushing for overnight camping in this area to boost tourism.

The Oakville Chamber has sought a ministry response on Bronte Creek camping since January. Staff retirements and planning requirements were cited by Rogers as reasons for slow progress on the matters.

"There are an awful lot of concerns to be addressed," said the ministry official.

Those he listed included design standards, fee structures, water and sewer services provided, soil conditions and road access.

But such considerations are academic until a site is determined, said Rogers.

Two locations being considered include land in the park that's north-east of the Bronte Creek and south of Highway 5; and a site east of Bronte Rd. (Highway 25) between the Halton Region building and Upper Middle Rd.

The latter parcel is on parkway belt land where a major athletic complex was proposed, then shelved. It has connections for water and sewer services.

Other sites may be looked at as well, said Rogers. The provincial park, currently for day use only, is located between Burloak Dr., and the Bronte Creek, just north of the Queen

Elizabeth Way. The province may lease the campground to a private operator, said Rogers.

This method is employed elsewhere and often saves costs, he said, adding fees charged would probably match those at other provincial parks.

Bronte Creek park attendance has generally increased, although it's down so far this year because of poor weather, said the ministry official.

Bronte Creek overnight camping isn't in the ministry budget through 1983, but Rogers said he would be contacting its supporters within two months.

Both the Oakville

Chamber and the town council want camping established soon in the park area.

"It would be the closest campground to Toronto," said Nancy Derrer, the Chamber's executive vice-president. "It seems we'd be missing an obvious opportunity without one."

There's a lack of good hotel accommodation in Oakville, and a campground would encourage more travellers to stay in the area, she added.

Two major visitor attractions near the park are the Canadian Open professional golf tournament at the Glen Abbey course, and salmon fishing in Bronte Creek during spawning season.

'Bad kids' dropping in school system

The number of "bad kids" in Halton schools is declining.

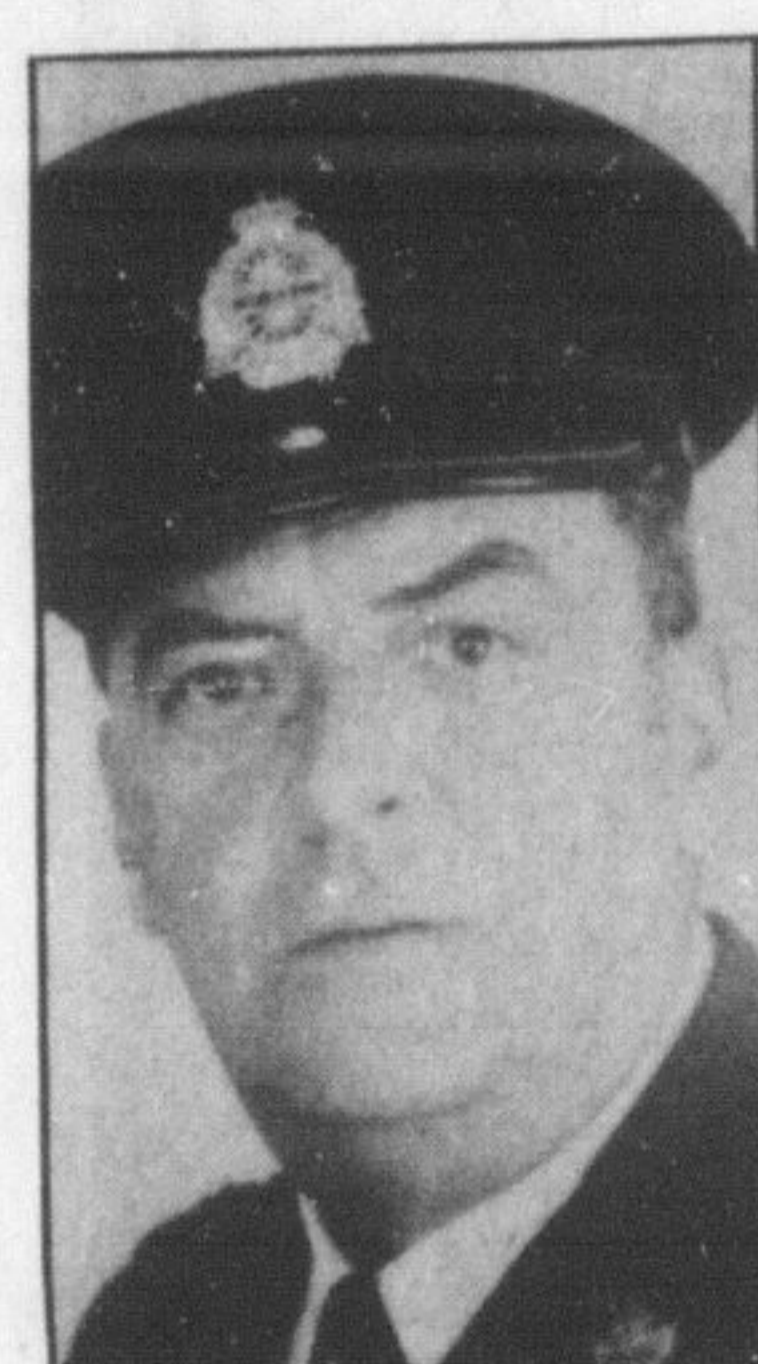
These "troubled and troublesome" young teenagers are the ones identified by Halton Board of Education committee studying why some students leave school before the age of 16.

Chairman of the Committee, Burlington Trustee Cam Jackson, patted himself and

fellow educators on the back Thursday at a board meeting, saying the decline "may indicate our system is more responsive to the needs of this young group of students."

For the first time this year the number of girls leaving school at an early age equals the number of boys.

Traditionally the percentage of males has been much higher.
