Keep your fish in good condition

THE FISHING PRESSURE on our lakes and streams is increasing each year and as a result the Department of Natural Resources is trying to do something to keep some fish for local fishermen.

The only way they are accomplishing this is to shorten the season on some species. This may not go over so well with some of our anglers who fish, not so much for sport, as to see how many fish they can catch. We call these people meat-hunters or fish-hogs. After all, you're allowed only so many fish in your possession at one time.

Did you know there were 644,550 non-resident licences sold in Ontario last year, virtually all to Americans. Most Americans are real good sports.

I have fished with a few on our far northern trips and found they stick to the law better than some of our own but unfortunately there are a few bad potatoes in the bag.

Americans are doing their best to keep their own waters stocked and if it wasn't for their help our splake, coho, chinook and other types of fish would be in real trouble. The ever-increasing number of Americans who come to the Sportsman's Show each year is a sure sign they would like to know what we in Canada have to offer.

For years we have suggested ways to fish. The next thing is how to keep your fish in top condition for eating.

This is a very important aspect of the sport many fishermen neglect. In fact, some fishermen catch a good string of fish then trail them in the water all day, throw them in the trunk of their car and clean them the next morning—and then wonder why they taste awful fishy.

A cheap plastic cooler can be purchased which will last for a couple of years. Clean your fish as soon after they're caught as you can. Put them in the cooler in a plastic bag with a little ice and they're good until you get home.

It doesn't take long to field dress a fish. All you need is a good sharp knife. We find the Rapala knife is your best bet. It has a thin blade which is easy to work with and takes and keeps a sharp edge.

If you haven't a flat surface to work on, use an oar.

Be sure to clean the blood line along the backbones. Wrap it tight in plastic stretch wrap.

If put on ice, your fish will keep up to five days. Properly cleaned, stored and cooked, Ontario game fish, in my opinion, are as good as European fish which are flown into our fancy restaurants and sold to you at a price which would nearly buy you a new rod and reel.
