Fish and Game news

Environment Minister Keith Norton is not happy with what is happening in Lake Ontario, all the same he goes on to assure the public there is no health hazard posed by the small amounts of Dioxin found in some Lake Ontario fish.

The very fact that this deadliest of all chemicals has shown up in any amount in Lake Ontario—whether it is below the danger level or not—is cause for great concern.

Mr. Norton has disclosed that a few fish taken from Lake Ontario—trout, bass, perch and smelt—showed small amounts of Dioxin ranging from 10 to 19 parts per trillion.

The source of the Dioxin has now been traced to three major sites; Hooker Chemical at Niagara Falls, New York and the nearby Olin Chemical plant, and Dow Chemical factory in Michigan.

Though Hooker and Olin had both abandoned the production of chemicals that produced Dioxin, some is still getting out of drainage ditches and storage tanks. They are doing everything possible to stop the leakage and we give them credit for this.

Fishing so far this year in the Kawartha lakes has been anything but good. They usually start to feed again in August, with the best fishing in September and October.

When people speak of bait fish they seem to think any small fish is a bait fish. This is not so. Bait fish means the mud minnow family, the stickleback and members of the minnow family except carp and definitely not goldfish, a member of the carp family. Many small lakes have been ruined by using the wrong bait.

Live bait must not be released into any body of water other than those where the fish were originally taken from. We have watched fishermen dump unused minnows into the lake at the end of their day's fishing. This is a no-no.

An angler may take bait fish for personal use by means of a dip net, which is not more than three feet square or three feet in diameter. He must put his name and address on his steel bait fish trap. He must not have more than 50 live bait fish in his possession at one time during the period of April 1 to October 14 or more than aggregate weight of forty pounds of bait fish during the period from October 15 to March 31.

No live bait fish may be brought into Ontario. We hope this will clean up some of the questions you have been asking.
