The weekend saw the Belvederes at a tourna-

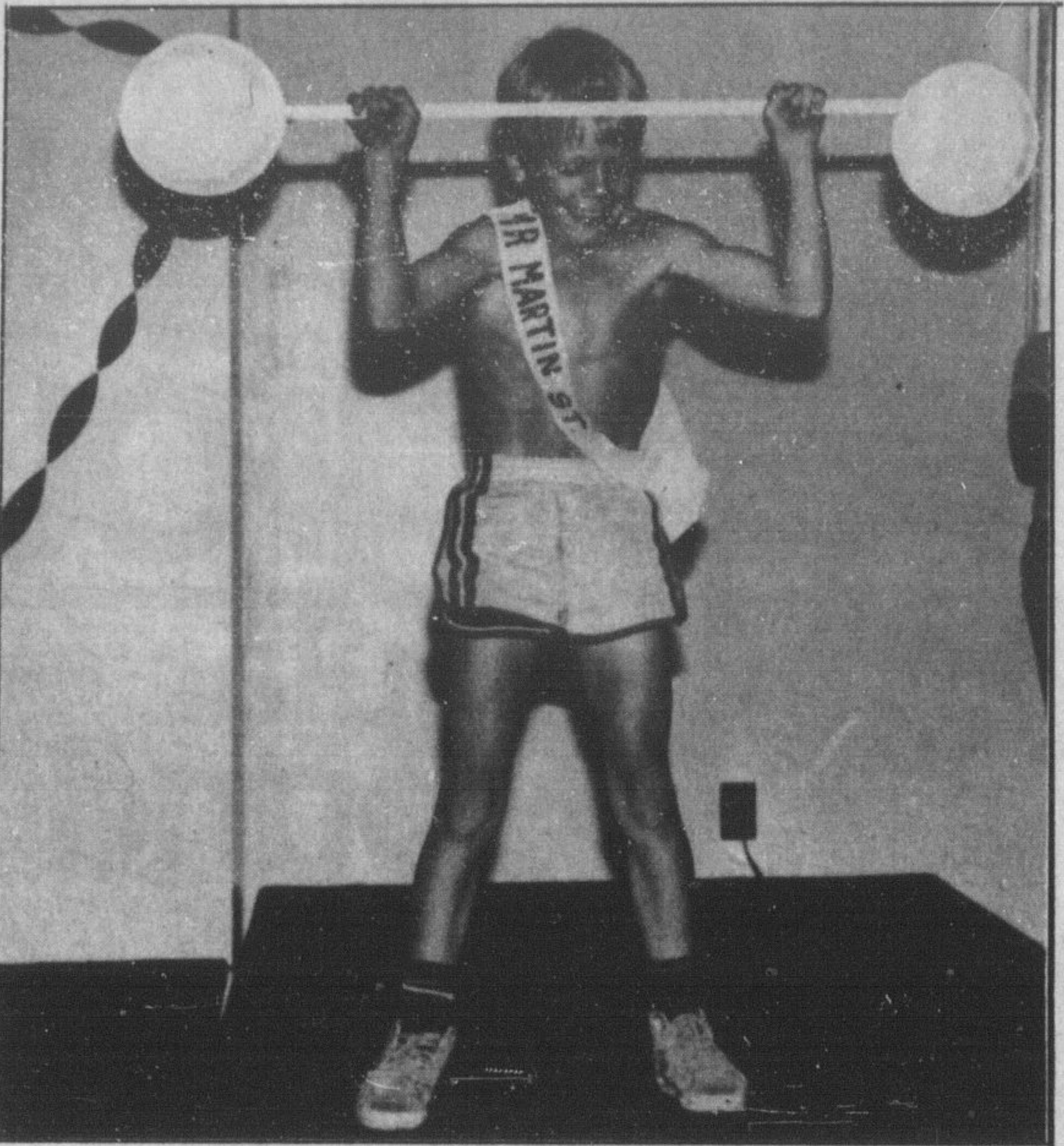
ment in Brampton and their first opponents were the Brampton "A" team. Milton put on a determined effort and only allowed Brampton one goal in the first half.
