# Hospital investigation follows second complaint

Complaints by two patients of Milton District Hospital concerning emergency treatment, have prompted an investigation by the hospital's board of directors and medical staff.

was annoyed with the inconvenience and the amount of pain she suffered hobbling back and forth from the hospital to the doctor's office.

In May, a Milton man was told to take his wife home and bring her back the next morning, after arriving at the emergency department of the hospital.

Both cases involve complaints of emergency procedures which forced the patients to go elsewhere for treatment.

Instead, Alexander Haag took his wife, Velma, 34 to Oakville—Trafalgar Memorial Hospital, where she was treated for internal bleeding as a result of torn ovaries.

In the most recent incident, Dianne Taylor of 341 Wilson Dr., Milton arrived at the hospital on the afternoon of July 22 with a fractured toe.

Mrs. Haag remained in hospital three days, then spent eight days at home in bed recuperating.

Although she was in a great deal of pain, Mrs. Taylor was told by hospital staff to see the hospital's doctor on call, Dr. M. Ho at his office on Main St.

Mr. Brady said one alternative to the present "on call" system would be to have a doctor at the hospital 24 hours a day, but at this time budget restraints make that idea "impossible."

Mrs. Taylor, escorted by her husband Carl, arrived at his office to be told she must go across the street to receive x-rays of her foot.

He noted the Oakville hospital this year only, instituted the practice of having a doctor around the clock, following complaints from patients, despite the fact the hospital handles three times the number of cases looked after by Milton.

Once the x-ray examinations were done, Mrs. Taylor was told she would have to go back to the hospital to have her toe reset and further x-rays taken.

Mr. Brady said the decision to launch an investigation into the two cases was made last Thursday following a discussion of the Haag complaint. Later that evening, Mrs. Taylor dropped off her notice of complaint.

Mrs. Taylor who said she "stewed" about the incident for a week before writing a letter to Mr. Brady, Milton Mayor Gord Krantz, Federal MP Otto Jelinek and two newspapers, said she

tations in the current emergency procedures.

Ironically, the hospital is in the midst of preparing for a major expansion of the hospital that would include in its first phase an update of the emergency wing.

The hospital addition construction is expected to get underway within the next six months, according to Mr.

Brady. He admitted the hospital is looking at the feasibility of having doctors run their practices from new offices at the hospital, as part of the expansion.

Mr. Brady said he has no idea how long the investigation into the two cases would take, but that a report would be made public upon its completion.

## Milton gravel concession pays off

Deciding to make the best of a bad bargain when it comes to gravel from wayside pits in Milton has paid off as far as Public Works Director John Matthews is concerned.

Milton decided to take some granular road building material at what Mr. Matthews referred to in a report "an attractive price" after it found it could not stop a gravel pit operator from extracting material for use in construction of

Highway 403 through Mississauga.

Mr. Matthews told council that "in the spring it became evident that Thompson Rd. would not stand up to the increased traffic volume" and was commencing to

deteriorate at a rapid pace.

"Works crews were attempting to maintain a passable surface with patch materials and had to dig out numerous locations where in-

adequate base caused rapid potholing in the road surface."

Mr. Matthews said consultations were held with the Ministry of Transportation, which included digging test holes. The tests showed further granular base would be needed to keep the road surface passable until funding can be located for a "proper" reconstruction project.

Noting the availability of the granular base at the wayside pit, Mr. Matthews said "We were able to greatly increase the base thickness, which should allow this road to be used as a detour road during the construction of the Ontario St. underpass."

To date, work has included the widening of the drainage culvert under the road south of Woodward Ave., to allow a continuous 24-foot wide road face from Main St. to Steeles Ave. to be

completed.

"The only work remaining is to regrade the road and apply a coat of prime and sand seal which will be performed by the successful contractor in our 1981 surface treating and prime program.

"We anticipate this work being done during the month of August and prior to it being completed, the works department will maintain the travelled portion in a passable condition and as dust free as possible," Mr. Matthews said.

## Halton teachers studying to prepare for classrooms

Nearly 70 Halton teachers are at school this summer in Hamilton taking courses directly related to their classroom work.

library and co-ordinator of instructional media for the Halton Board of Education.

"Children don't naturally fall into reading. To make reading interesting, there must be many interesting books," she said.
