Recommendations to help pickerel

TWO NEW HARVEST control measures in eastern Ontario and the Bay of Quinte have been proposed to accelerate the recovery of yellow pickerel stocks, announced James Auld, provincial minister of Natural Resources.

He said the new regulations being recommended to Ottawa should come within the next few months.

The area affected is Division 8, on your fishing map, which includes the Bay of Quinte, eastern Lake Ontario, East Lake, West Lake, and Consecr Lake.

Some of these changes will make the line fisherman happy. The use of commercial fishing gill nets with four-and-a-half inch mesh will be banned in Lake Ontario, under this recommendation.

Creel limits for anglers will be four fish instead of the previous six.

The restrictions will allow a greater amount of pickerel from the abundant 1978 hatchings to reach spawning age.

Strong support for these measures has been indicated by many local interest groups including municipal representatives, tourist outfitters and angling associations. And when you pass a law that makes this many people happy, without a lot of complaining, you really have a law that suits everyone. Not very often this happens.

Harvest levels for angling and commercial fishing were excessive in 1980 and threatened the establishment of a large wide brood stock. It is imperative we have this broodstock to increase our pickerel fishing.

Successful rehabilitation of the pickerel fishing will have a strong role in strengthening the economy of this area (now quite depressed for lack of fish) so no fisherman who spends lots of money on food, tackle, and accommodations.

Pickerel began spawning successfully again in the Bay of Quinte in the mid 70's after a water quality improvement program was implemented.

The multi-million dollar sewage abatement program on the Trent River and the Bay of Quinte resulted in an encouraging increase in the number of game fish in the area.

Yours truly fished this part of the Bay of Quinte in the 50's and had no trouble getting our catch. Then, all of a sudden, horrible pollution and a very noticable catch of fish.

The Bay of Quinte has been a huge success as had certain parts of Lake Erie that was once declared, "past the point of no return."

It can be done.

Juniors imitate

The best players in the world all started to play golf at a very early age. As soon as a youngster shows any interest, he is old enough.

A couple of sawed off clubs to start swinging with is about all a kid needs. If he/she shows any desire to play the game, junior clubs can be purchased for about \$60.

Lessons are a good idea at the very beginning before the junior develops a bad swing. The fastest way to lose a kid's interest is to take him out for a private lesson and try and drill something into his head for half an hour.

Young people have a great capacity to imitate and seem to learn better when grouped with others their own age.

I like to teach junior group lessons. All I have to do is show them a few basic fundamentals, then hit a few shots and say, "do it like this". Pretty soon I have a half dozen carbon copies of my own swing.

The Ontario Golf Association holds all kinds of junior tournaments for players of all abilities. The competition is great for the kids and the game of golf is a real character builder.

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
