Helpful Harry

Children can have fun making silver leaves out of dried leaves. First have them collect half a dozen perfect leaves from different trees and shrubs.

Place them in a row on a table with the vein sides up, leave some space between each leaf. Next, lay a strip of smooth aluminum foil on the leaves. Rub vigorously with your finger tips until the outline of each leaf, vein and stem is reproduced on the foil.

Trim the foil, then glue the edges of the foil to a strip of cardboard for display. Carefully write the name of each leaf with a felt tipped pen under each leaf for identification purposes.

This is an ideal project to keep them busy on a rainy or cold day.

A handy clothes caddy for the laundry room or a clothes cupboard can be easily constructed out of a shelf standard and bracket. Mount a short length of standard on a wall near the ironing board, about 66 inches above the floor. Use a 12-inch shelf bracket which will hold at least a dozen ironed shirts or blouses. A standard and bracket can also be installed in a clothes closet to hold shirts, etc.

Leftover syrup from canned fruit can be used for making unusual tasting fruit drinks. Freeze the syrup in an ice-cube tray. Add the cubes to unsweetened lemonade when required.

Very fresh bread is easier to slice if it is chilled in the fridge first.

Dried onion and celery flakes give a quick seasoning "lift" to soups, stews and stuffings.

To stop an avocado mixture from discoloring, put the stone back in and cover it with cling film, but remember to remove the stone before serving.

When making asparagus rolls, roll the slices of bread out with a rolling pin before buttering them. This makes it easy to roll the bread round the asparagus, without it breaking or splitting.

Make a tasty instant milk shake by mixing half a small carton of fruit flavored yogurt into a glass of cold milk.

When straining fruit it is better to use a nylon mesh sieve than a wire one which might taint or discolor the fruit.

Keep a buttonhole flower fresh all day by singeing the end of the stem with a match or lighter flame after standing it in water overnight.

Plants don't like tobacco smoke, so remove them from the room if you're ex-

pecting a group of smoking guests.

Ask guests at a bridal or baby shower to sign their names and addresses plus postal codes in a special guest book. The bride or new mother will then have all the information she needs to send out thank you notes.

Carved decorations on furniture which are usually difficult to dust in the usual way can be cleaned thoroughly by using a soft-bristled brush that is dipped occasionally in a shallow container filled with liquid furniture polish.

Trying to find a secluded spot at the beach or picnic ground for a change room when switching to a bathing suit is often difficult. If you take a large umbrella, e.g. the kind carried by golfers, and a shower curtain the next time you go to the beach for a swim, and a tree is handy, the problem of a changing room is solved.

Just open up the umbrella and hang it upside down by hooking the handle over a tree branch. Hook the eyelets of the shower curtain over the tips of the umbrella and you have your own private changing room. The same idea can be used on a camping trip.

Next time you run out of macaroni for a macaroni-cheese dish, substitute some medium size noodles instead. The family

will never know the difference.

If the family likes gravy on the main course of a meal and you want to surprise them by dishing up a gravy that is a bit different try this—sprinkle some instant potato mix into the hot meat juice. Swish it around a few times and serve. This kind of gravy will not only be lumpless, but also nourishing.

A dash or so of instant coffee grains will turn your light colored gravy into a dark golden color. The coffee won't effect the taste.

If you have ever wondered what to do with stale left over popcorn, try using it as croutons in soup for children. They will love it.

Small sponge rubber balls impaled on closet door hooks or nails will prevent clothes hung on the hooks, etc. from having unsightly bulges in the material. They can be easily painted the same color as the door.

Frequently ironing board covers get a tear or bad scorch burn right through the material. There is no need to discard the damaged cover and buy a new one, try repairing it first with a piece of iron-on tape or trouser patch. Just iron it on and you will probably find the repair patch will outlast the material in the original cover.
