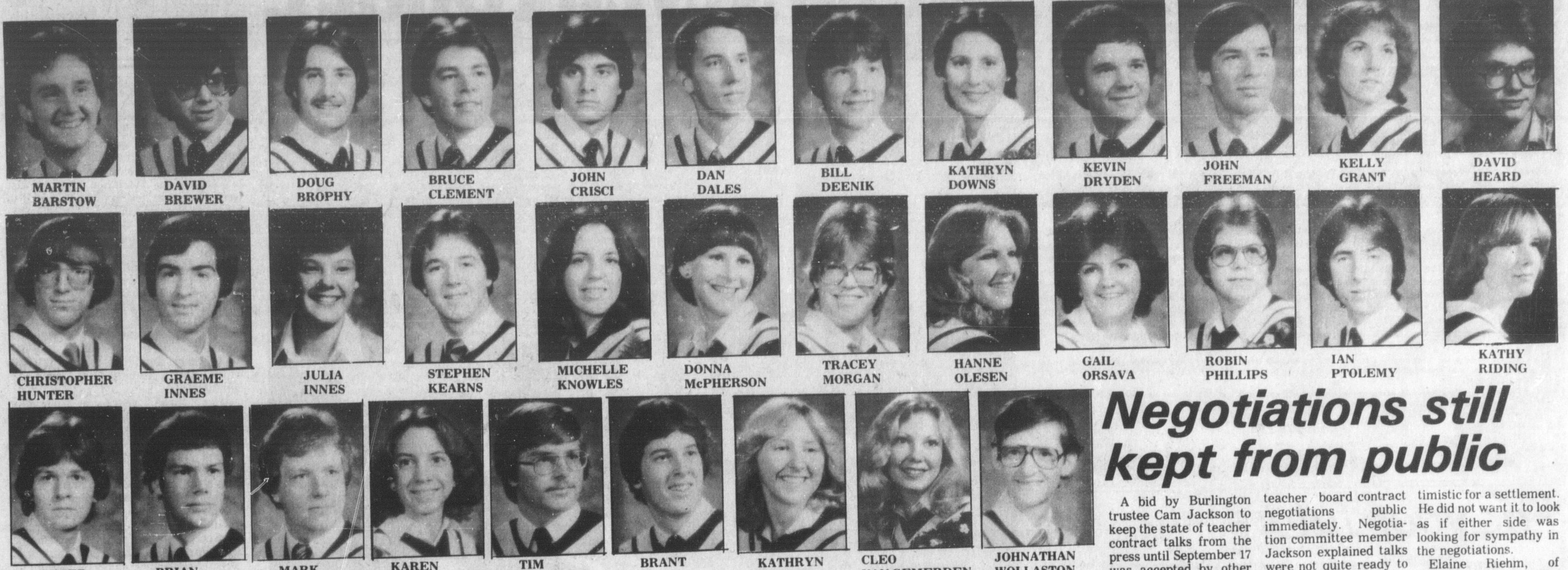


Milton District High School announces 36 Ontario Scholars

A bid by Burlington trustee Cam Jackson to keep the state of teacher contract talks from the press until September 17 was accepted by other members of the Halton Board of Education.

teacher board contract negotiations immediately. Negotiation committee member Jackson explained talks were not quite ready to become public.

To go public at this time, Jackson said, would make the press a battleground. Right now, he stated, the teachers' federation can

Elaine Riehm, of Burlington said talks should be completed as quickly as possible, and if an impasse is reached then the committee and the teachers' federation can go public.

T.V. tower on town line

McLean Hunter Cable Television of Guelph can construct a microwave tower on the Milton side of The Town Line, with no objection from the Town of Halton Hills.

This week planning board agreed to notify Milton there is no objection from this side of the line.

The 200 foot tower will be built 600 feet back from the road, across from the existing signal towers owned by Halton Hills Cable TV.

Only one home is in the area, with another a quarter mile north. The land is described in the planner's report as treed with wet marshy spots.
