

## Cyclists welcome to join Terry Fox run

All stops have been pulled for the local Marathon of Hope run Sunday—Terry Fox Day—as not only walkers, runners and joggers will be allowed to participate but cyclists as well.

Organizer Colin Best hopes the addition of cycles in the 10 kilometer run will encourage more Miltonians to become involved. The local unit of the Canadian Cancer Society has also decided

not to charge the suggested \$5 entry fee, again with the intent of attracting more participants.

The route will begin at Milton District High School track and will span many areas of the town so more will be able to spectate the actual run, according to Mr. Best. He said as much of the route as possible will be in the shade.

McDonald's restaurant is contributing orange juice to be available at rest stops established at St. Peter's and Sam Sherratt schools. The restaurant will also be making pledge sheets available. Town hall, all local schools and Dixie Lee Restaurant at Laurier Centre will also have pledge sheets.

Two separate runs to raise funds for cancer research last year

yielded \$27,000, a figure organizers hope to exceed this year. Donation boxes will be set around the route so non-participants can do their part.

Milton Springs Gymnastics Club has indicated its support for the event again this year and Gary Flemming has asked all baseball team coaches to encourage team members to participate.

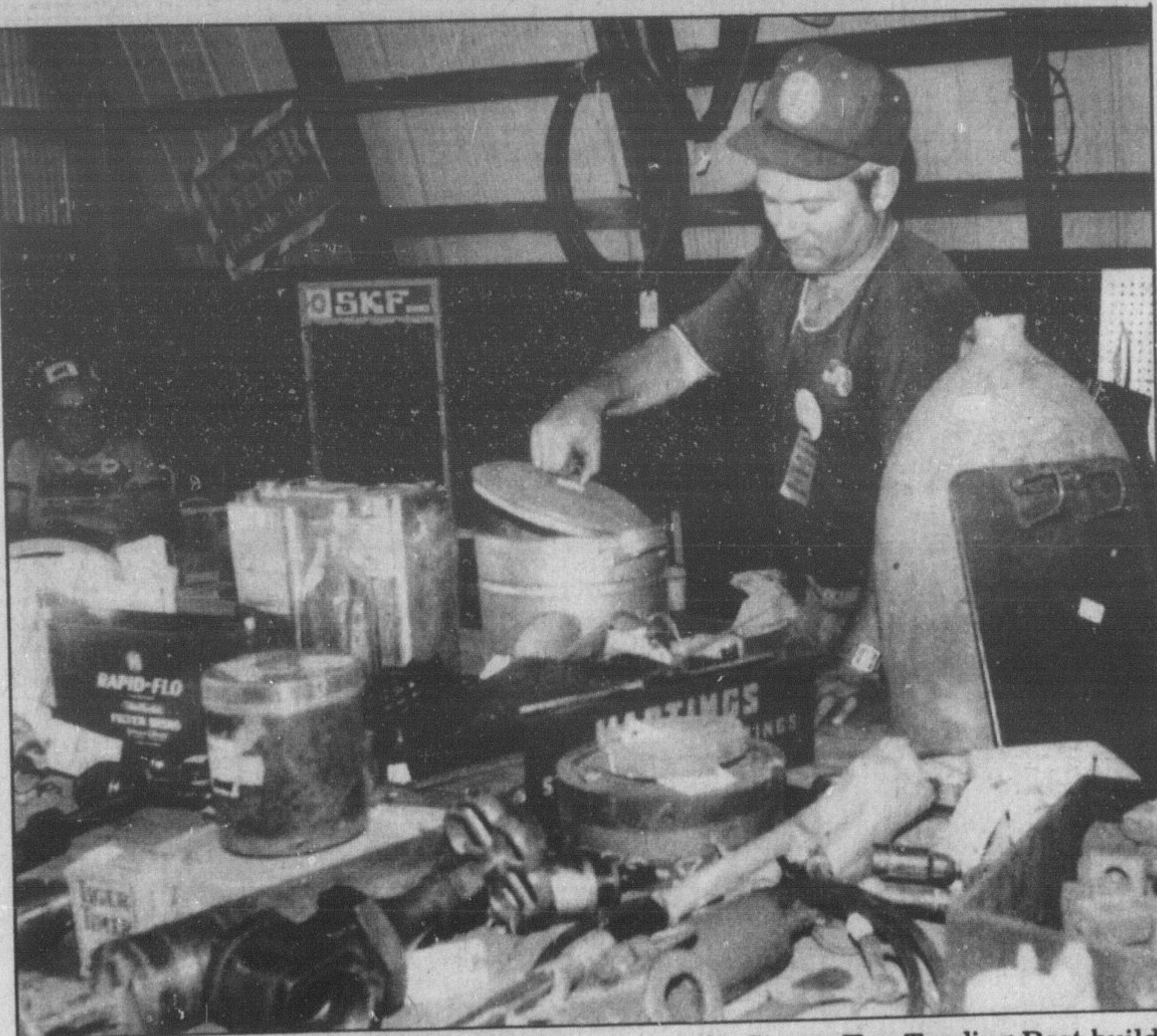
A receipt at the bottom of pledge sheets should be turned in with sponsor money to any chartered bank in town. The local Cancer society will collect the donations from there.
