

Employees' families tour glass company facility



Quality control. Nobody would blame Consumers Glass employee Tracey Blewett for getting a little glassy eyed keeping a close eye on these bottles.

The families of 200 Consumers Glass employees in Milton had an opportunity to view the process of bottle making for the first time Saturday.

The glass company opened its doors to family members for the afternoon, allowing visitors to view the intricate process of how 1,400 different varieties of bottles are made.

The Milton plant is one of five Consumers Glass plants in Canada and

makes the green-colored type, commonly used for soft drinks, wine and export beer.

Established just one year ago in Milton, the local plant exports approximately half of its bottle products.

The plant produces 245 export beer bottles every 60 seconds. "This plant was built to serve the beer and wine market in Canada," explained Robert Harper, public relations officer for the company.

Although there is room for another two furnaces, it is not known at this time when the plant will expand. The plant operates 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

To shut down for any length of period would be too costly, explained Mr. Harper.

Parade organizers start search for 1981 funds

The Christmas season wouldn't seem the same if there was no Santa Claus parade, so local organizers have begun lining up bands and majorettes for the event despite lack of funds.

The annual plea for donations began two weeks ago when letters requesting funds were sent to local businesses, but according to parade marshal Jim Strain, responses have been slow in coming.

If this is any indication of public support then Mr. Strain says, "We're going to be desperate."

He said the price for bands alone has risen 10 per cent due to increased transportation costs.

To offer some added incentive to parade participants this year, prize money is being given for the best theme float, runner-up theme float and most creative non-theme float.

Any song ever written about Christmas can be used to form ideas for floats to be based on A Christmas Songsheet theme. Service clubs have received entry forms for parade floats and any further groups can contact Mr. Strain or Bonnie Ward of Milton Parks and Recreation Department for forms.

The parade, to be held Nov. 14, at 2.30 p.m., will follow a new route this year ending at Memorial Arena, Thompson Rd. instead of E. C. Drury School.

The fair grounds will once again provide

room for participants to position themselves to start the parade which will follow Brown St. to Mary St. onto Main St.

The parade marshal indicated eight bands have been confirmed to participate including Milton District Pipe Band, the traditional parade leaders.

Another pipe band has been added to the lineup this year because of the local popularity of pipe bands. The Sand Hill Pipe Band will contribute to the procession for the first time in Milton.

Drum and bugle corps including the Ambassadors and Signals from Toronto, Durham Girls and possibly the award winning Venturers from Kitchener will add to the parade.

The Brampton Clown Band, York Lions Steel Band and Burlington Teen Tour band will return to Milton's parade route this year.

In order to help pay for the talents of these bands, a fund raising dance will be held at the Lion's Club Hall, Thompson Rd. arena, Oct. 24 from 7.30 p.m. to 1 a.m.

Tickets for this event are \$10 a couple. Entertainment is being supplied by disc jockey Jim Berry, free of charge. Contact Colin Best at 878-3623 for tickets.
