### Good news in forest industry

THINK EVERYONE WOULD AGREE that this would be quite a bleak and dismal world if there were no trees. As any true sportsman will tell you, almost to a man, they all love trees and are quite concerned with our quickly disappearing forests.

Well, we think we have good news for you. To begin with, in Kirkland Lake we have a very busy and productive seedling operation. It is jointly owned and run by the federal and provincial governments. This facility will produce 13 million jack-pine and black-fir seedlings.

Five million seedlings will be allocated to areas being managed by forest agreement with Abitibi Price Inc., Spruce Falls Power and Paper Co. and E.B. Eddy Forest Products Ltd. As the snow melted in the spring of 1981, our forestry branch started a new form of re-planting our forests through aerial seedings. Seeds were loaded into two planes which operate on the buddy system.

Two Piper PA 18 planes worked in pairs. This is a much safer operation as these planes fly to places where there are few landing places. If a plane gets into trouble, the buddy plane can immediately go for help after taking a reading where the accident happened. Help could be there in a short time with a government helicopter.

Weather conditions must be perfect. Seeds were released about 100 feet above a burned-out or logged-out area. The spring rains gently pressed the seeds into the ground.

We wish them every success in their new venture which, so far, has proven successful. A controlled deer hunt will again be held in the Cambridge district for four days Nov. 2-5. A lottery will select 985 hunters at the end of September. Of the allotted permits, 75 per cent will go to residents in the zone. In addition, farmers and land owners who reside on a minimum of 50 acres automatically qualify for a permit for the zones in which they live.

Shotguns and muzzle loaders are the only allowable firearms and the use of dogs is forbidden.

Coho salmon are few and far between as the Toronto Star Great Salmon Hunt reaches the midway point.

The salmon aren't very far out from shore now. This past week fog, rain and rough water kept all but the large charter boats off the lake. Please, take no chances with fog or rough water. A few nice fish are being caught off the pier at Bronte.

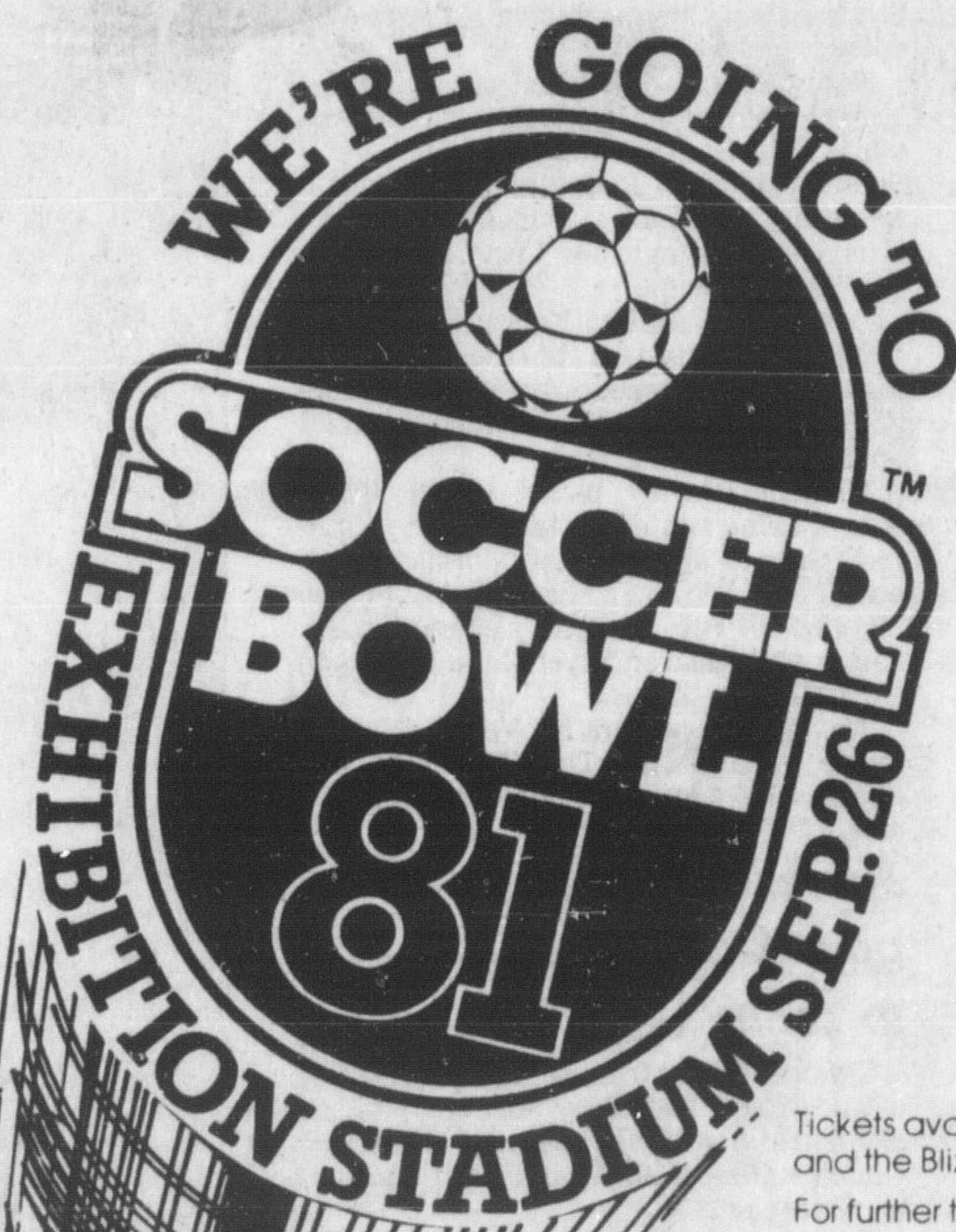
