Shutterbugs urged to enter

Shutter bugs, take note! Halton Region Conservation Authority will once again hold its annual photography contest, open to all amateur photographers. The theme of this year's competition is the Niagara Escarpment and includes any aspects of the topic such as natural vistas, wildlife and all forms of recreation related to the escarpment. Categories will include black and white prints, color prints and color slides. All prints must be 5 by 7 inches or larger and must be matted or cardboard mounted. Entrants may submit up to a maximum of three entries to each of the categories. First prize in each category will be \$25 and a 1982 season's car pass. Second place winners will receive \$15 plus a 1982 pass and third prize will be \$10 plus a season's pass. Closing date for entries is Oct. 31, 1981. Entries may be sent by mail or delivered to one of the following locations: Halton Conservation Authority offices, 310 Main St. (weekdays) or the Moundsberg Wildlife Centre, RR 2, Campbellville (weekends). All photographs must be taken within the geographical boundaries of the Halton Region watershed. Some places to choose from are: Moundsberg Wildlife Centre, Burns Nature Area, Campbellville Community Pond, Hilton Falls Conservation Area, Esquesing Conservation Area, Rattlesnake Point Conservation Area, Kelso, Crawford Lake Conservation Area, Carlisle Community Pond and Mount Nemo Conservation Area. Following the contest, all entries will be returned. A self-addressed, stamped envelope is required. Registration forms must be completed by each entrant and these are obtainable at any conservation area gate house or the main office at 310 Main St. All entries will be judged in November by a panel of professional photographers and HRCA staff members. All winning photographs will be published in the Conservation Cornerstone. Winners will be notified by mail.

Reed spent less winning than Baines did

Julian Reed may have won the ballot battle but he lagged considerably behind his main opponent in the provincial election last March, Fran Baines, when it came to spending money.

The Commission on Election Contributions and Expenses released candidate spending figures

for all Ontario election ridings recently.

In Halton-Burlington Reed hung on against a strong challenge from Tory Baines to win his third straight election. New Democrat Chris Cutler was a distant third in the election.

But, when it came to spending money Baines way way out in front. The statement she filed on

campaign spending and contributions under the Election Finances Reform Act showed she spent \$32,537.31 compared to Reed's \$19,094.28. Cutler spent \$4,883.51.

Reed polled 13,395 votes, Baines 12,877 and Cutler 3,500.

Enrolment booms at Sheridan College

Sheridan College has experienced an unusual trend in enrolment for 1981-82 which has resulted in a 2.7 per cent increase in full-time post-secondary students.

This represents 5,639 students enrolled in 14 different schools and divisions at five of Sheridan's eight campuses in Halton and Peel.

"The percentage is down somewhat from original projections, mainly because students did not return to the second year of their program at the rate we had expected," said Registrar Ralph Beaty.

He said that the return rate for third year was higher than anticipated, but when it balances out, Sheridan is short about 200 students who were supposed to return but didn't.

"The number of freshmen (3,358) is right on target," Beaty added.

The enrolment breakdown by campus is 3,235 at Oakville, 1,962 at Brampton, 197 at Credit Valley, 169 at Lorne Park and 76 at Milton. Another 110 are taking courses part-time during the day.

The areas of growth

this year include business, computer, technology, visual arts and applied arts.

In addition to the increase in full-time post-secondary enrolment, there has been a substantial increase in the Community Services Division which offers part-time day, evening and weekend courses at 10 locations in Halton and Peel.

While total enrolment for Community Services is 18,000 for the fall session, this number is expected to total 40,000 by the end of the academic year.

Milton Corvette show turnout down

Unsettled weather meant fewer participants than last year, in Milton Corvette Club's second annual show, but a sampling of cars ranging from 1956 to 1980 turned out for the event recently.

Livio Bonin, a club member said the 16 cars exhibited at Richardson Chev-Olds belonged to members of other clubs from Hamilton, Cambridge, Toronto and Burlington.

"We had double the turnout last year," he
