Helpful Harry

Do you need a certain color flower bouquet for a special occasion? If none are available you may be able to make up your own bouquet. Take a bunch of white flowers such as phlox or sweet peas and soak the stems for about an hour in some warm water into which has been emptied a small bottle of vegetable food coloring of the tint you need.

Don't discard purses, suitcases or attache cases just because the handle is broken. Replace the handle with a strong dog collar. These can be purchased often quite cheaply in most pet stores or from the pet supplies racks of supermarkets. They come in various sizes and colors so they can easily be matched up with the color of the suitcase or case. Slip the collar through the metal loops and fasten to the size you find most comfortable for carrying.

Driving a tack or brad in a tight corner or into a recessed area where there is no finger or hammer swinging room can be simplified by sticking the tack through a strip of paper and holding its head against the head of a spike or longer nail. Striking the point of the longer nail will drive in the tack. Just before the tack is seated, tear the paper free.

Put your garlic press to work when stuffing hard boiled eggs. The press will

mesh the egg yolks quickly and easily.

A cheap and different tie rack can be made out of a 'budgie' ladder. Fasten it in place with a couple of screw eyes. It will swing up easily for tie selection.

Flattened nap in spots on your rug where heavy furniture has been placed can be restored to its original condition with a steam iron. Pass the iron back and forth over the flattened area, about an inch above the rug.

A discarded trouser hanger can be converted into a dandy bag holder for the kitchen. Fold bags into squares and clip together in the hanger. The hanger takes up little space hung up in the cleaning closet or kitchen cupboard.

An emergency funnel can be made out of an envelope. Cut off one corner so the hole is large enough to allow any liquid or powdery substance to flow through easily. No need to use a new envelope for this hint, use the corner from an envelope that contained junk mail or bills.

Another idea if you ever need to fill a small-necked bottle but can't find a suitable funnel try using half an eggshell with a small hole pricked in its end. The shell will last longer, be less brittle and can be used more than once if it is placed in the

oven until the white surface is browned slightly.

Cake type shoe polishes that have become hard from exposure to the air can be reclaimed by sprinkling a few drops of turpentine on the polish. Replace lid set aside for a few hours and the 'turps' will soon soften the polish.

A few 'gobs' of hubby's liquid shaving soap sprayed on a mirror in the bathroom will give the mirror a super shine. Spread the soap over the surface with a piece of damp paper towelling then polish with a clean cloth or sheet of newspaper. This treatment will also help to prevent fogging of the mirror which usually results when the bathtub is filled with hot water or the shower has been used.
