Bouncing back from a three-point disadvantage at halftime, the junior girls basketball team from Milton District High School moved to the Halton championship game with a 43-39 win over Aldershot High School of Burlington Wednesday at MDHS.

The club plays Lester B. Pearson school of Burlington Friday night for the championship at MDHS in what promises to be one of the most exciting games of the year.

The pressure was on when the junior girls came up against a tough Aldershot squad in sudden-death basketball semi-finals.

Milton was behind for most of the first half. Aldershot played excellent defence as they stopped several attempts of Milton fast breaks. Breaks are the key to their offence. Without them, their offence slowed considerably because they had few other plays which could work as effectively as the fast break. The score at the half was 19-16 for Aldershot.
