Clay works exhibit at Milton Library

When students at Trillium School were asked to create with clay, the results of their self-expression promoted an art ex-hibition at Milton Public Library from now

until December 3. The clay works evolved from a threeweek session with professional potter Agnes Olive of Terra Cotta a three-week session with progessional potter Agnes Olive of Terra Cotta, who was recently ac-

cepted as a member of the American Institute of Art Therapists. "The project was set up to create individual expression—which is important

for the students," explains the artist. The first phase of the project began in the spring with the students divided into small groups. They were asked to mold balls of clay into assigned shapes during a 30- second time limit. Agnes Olive sug-

gested the minimal time frame left no room for students to censor their initial thoughts or experience apprehension.

Everything from a giant hamburger to personalized mugs and a downhill skier will be included in the display. The products of the project helped reinforce that each of the students is a unique and creative person, according to Agnes Olive.
