
Hyers for sale


The league might want to look into the possibility of allowing players to have three or fivegame trials with Aeros without any loss of status for this year or next.

The largest non-playoff crowd in two years watched Miltowne Realty Aeros suffer a 10-5 defeat to Rockton Real McCoys in Milton Minor Hockey Night Friday at Milton Sports Centre.

It was a disappointing result from an otherwise successful night as new owner Gary Thomas's promotional skills drew about 500 spectators for the contest.

Ironically, it was a couple of ex-Aeros who stole the spotlight. Defenceman Doug Schoenfeld, a member from last year's club which knocked off Rockton in the first round of playoffs, scored three goals. Former Aeros' coach Barrie Elliott was behind Rockton's bench and extracted a certain degree of satisfaction beating Aeros for a couple of reasons (Milton's playoff win last year and the fact he wasn't re-

hired to coach the club two years ago). National Hockey League referee Bruce Hood dropped the puck for the opening face-off with a player from Milton Minor Hockey, Glen Thomas, and watched the game.

Gary Thomas distributed two dozen free hockey sticks to minor hockey players in a special draw and also gave out two team sweaters. The uniforms were donated courtesy Canadian Sports Distribution Ltd. One was a likeness to Edmonton Oilers' Wayne Gretzky while the other was similar to Toronto Maple Leafs' Darryl Sittler.

It marked one of the largest crowds to ever watch a regular-season intermediate game in Milton although much of the reason was through

the free tickets. Unfortunately, the club couldn't put the icing on the cake with a victory. However at 13-1, Rockton does not lose many games and has dropped just five regular-season contests in the past

two seasons. Rockton jumped out to a quick 4-0 lead after the teams had played nearly 14 minutes of scoreless hockey. Although shots on goal weren't recorded, Aeros goalie John Muizelaar dominated the first 15 minutes when Rockton had several

good scoring chances. The dam broke with six minutes to play when Schoenfeld's shot from the point found its way through a maze of players and into the net.

Aeros closed the gap to 4-1 five minutes into the second period but Rockton replied with a pair of goals before the period was out and coasted to the comfortable win.

It is apparent the team's weakness is on the blue line. Offensive players Barry Trood, Glen Murray and Paul McCann were placed on the blue line for most of the game. It was obvious they were confused in their own zone and their scoring talents were wasted on defence.

The club was missing Bill Bryant, a defenceman, and centreman Archie Chase, the club's leading scorer.

Aeros ran into difficulties playing ineligible players when both Lorne Lesuk and Denis Longpre, who were suspended because of an altercation in the previous game, suited up. Longpre took himself out of the game just five minutes into the opening period but Lesuk played the entire game. The OHA usually doubles the suspension. Doug Fry, easily the best player on the ice,



Flyers make more news with off-ice activities

Milton Flyers have been creating more news off the ice than on.

Consider these incidents which have occurred over the past couple of weeks. Rumors have re-circulated that the team is for

sale. Owner Beth Gooding says she is willing to sell the club tomorrow if someone makes the right offer. - Flyers' protest of a defeat to Oakville Blades was upheld by the OHA Board of Directors which, if the decision stands, would be the

lone blemish in Oakville's winning season. - So many players have left the team in the past week, Flyers took just 12 skaters and one goaltender to Brampton Saturday. When the goalie was ejected, captain Bill Lynch donned the pads and played the final two minutes in

- Flyers lost 5-3 at home to the previous occupants of the cellar, Dixie, at home Friday

night, and now have it all to themselves.

- Flyers two representatives on an all-star team don't play for the club anymore. Going back to the first point,

rumors have been travelling about for about a month now that the Flyers are on the block. Flyers' owners Vern and Beth

Gooding say no concrete offer has been received although Beth acknowledged a verbal offer has been discussed. Several people associated with Milton Minor Hockey, but not speaking on behalf of MMHA,

have indicated they are interested in purchasing the team. But they asked their names not be used until something breaks. "I've not received any written offers," explained Beth. "But we're interested in selling the

team. If they come to us with an offer then yes we'd consider it.

"It seems to be getting too much. We're a little tired and weary. A price for the team has not been named but

sources indicate a purchase price above \$10,000 would be in line. On the second point, Oakville manager Murray Walker says he will appeal an OHA decision which led to an overturning of a 10-1 win into a 1-0

defeat "I intend on appealing the decision as soon as possible," explained Walker. "I feel it's an at-

tempt to discredit me and not the team." The problem concerns a little-known player by the name of Chris MacRae who was playing Junior Chockey in Little Brittain. Blades worked out a deal whereby MacRae would be given a five-game trial with Blades.

Walker signed the player to an Oakville card, took it to the OHA, put his name in the line-up and in the program. The player became eligible when he was to obtain his release and it was in the hands of the OHA.

The release didn't come until after MacRae played against Flyers therefore making him ineligible. Flyers noted the miscue and quickly lodged a protest.

"The rule states that anyone knowingly making false representation should be penalized,' added Walker. "I'll make my appeal on that

"I feel it was an error in judgment and a technicality. The person in Little Brittain simply didn't get around to doing it.

"I have nothing to hide. We took his card to the OHA. We put his name in the program and on the game sheet. If I was going to sneak in a ringer, I certainly wouldn't have done that.

"I'm aware some teams have used players who aren't listed on the scoresheet. That's the way some teams bring in a

MacRae was not a dominant factor in the game and the decision of the appeal is expected around Christmas.

Thirdly, Flyers lost goalie Derrick Neelands when the netminder had words with owner Vern Gooding between the second and third periods Friday night. Neelands broke his goal stick over the net after allowing a soft goal and when he came off the ice, Vern told him if he was to break his

sticks in that way he could buy his own. The two got into an argument and Neelands left and watched the rest of the game from the

Coupled with the leaving of Steve Eichmeier, Kent Nixon and Joe Sime for various reasons, Flyers were left with just 13 players for its game with Brampton.

That has been partially rectified with the addition of two players from Burlington who were obtained in a trade for goalie Mike Shepherd. Fourthly, the western division of the Central Ont. Jr. B League (i.e. all teams west of Hwy. 10)

named an all-star team to compete in a tournament in Kitchener during the Christmas holiday period. All teams are to have representation. Milton's reps-Joey Gaeton and Mike Shepherd who both
