thought our readers might have thought was referring to them. While no referee in Milton made anything approaching this amount the local referees thought my comments might hinder their efforts to negotiate a fee increase with MYSC. At the AGM of the Milton branch of the ORSA, most of the time was spent on a discussion of what fees they should ask for and very little time on what they

could be doing to improve the supply of

referees and the standard of refereeing. If the only function of the OSRA is to negotiate fees, I don't see what purpose i serves. The Ontario Soccer Association, which governs the game in this province, a fact which some branches of the OSRA sometime appear to overlook, states in its constitution referee fees should be set by the league and referees should be appointed by the league. A referee should be free to decide, as an individual whether he, or she, should accept an

It has become traditional in some areas for the local branch of the OSRA to appoint officials on behalf of the league, as has happened for the last few years in Milton. This creates some problems as the MYSC and the Inter-County League

are now finding. The main problem is that when the OSRA branch is handling the appointments the league is stuck with paying the fee which that branch sets and it gets whatever referee, good, bad or indifferent, which is appointed.

The second problem is that if sufficient referees are not available on any given day, the local OSRA branch will rarely bring in referees from outside or make other arrangements to cover the games. This was the experience of the Inter-

County League last year,. The Italian-Canadian Club had to make arrangements to cover their games with Oakville referees and MYSC found numerous house-league games were not covered.

I do not believe MYSC needs to pay any more for house-league games. After all, the referee has very little expense for these games, and by way of comparison, a coach does not get to cover his expenses. House-league games used to be done for the love of the game.

I understand two more experienced local referees have resigned from the OSRA branch. I am sure if MYSC bit the bullet and arranged to appoint their own referees in 1982, they would find they would be just as well off in terms of games covered and considerably better

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


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
