From the outgoing fishing director, we quote from one of his fine reports:

Most fishing seasons are now closed except for those hardy souls who fish for rainbow trout.

Last Nov. 7, Don Kearney, Lorne Lyons and Mike Merritt went down to the Ganaraska River. Don got the first fish, Jim got one at 4 1/2 lb. (that's just the size to put in the frying pan) and they are delicious from ice-cold water.

Jack and Donnie Pearson were at the same place and Donnie caught one rainbow. The whole gang went from there to Wilmot Creek but had no luck.

The Ministry of Natural Resources got eggs from brown trout at Owen Sound and from the Ganaraska River. They also took 250,000 chinook eggs from fish out of Bronte Creek.

Jim says the proposed plantings this year in Ontario is around 1.5 million fish.

New York state had a good catch of spawning fish and plan to plant 500 million in Lake Ontario. The survival rate will bring that count down to about half.

As we said before, the deer hunt in Ontario was a huge success. The biggest deer shot by a club member weighed in at 222 lbs. It was a 10-point buck and was shot by Mike Wilson.

Russ Saunders shot an 11-point buck deer which dressed out at 207 lbs.

The only moose shot by a club member this year was downed by Bruce Finlay.

Landry's shorthanded goals lifts Comets in poor effort

Bob Landry scored two shorthanded goals in the third period to salvage a 5-3 win for Milton Canadian Tire major midget Comets over Oakville Monday night at Memorial Arena.

In a relatively uninspired effort, Comets fell behind 2-1, after one period and 3-2 after two before Landry's scoring exploits with four goals in the contest managed a degree of respectability for the club.

Comets began the contest well and worked the puck into Oakville's zone on several instances but failed to capitalize, choosing instead to work the puck free for a perfect set-up.

Oakville opened the scoring midway through the opening frame and then upped the lead to 2-0 at the 13-minute mark of the game.

Landry cut the lead in half with his first goal of the game 16 seconds before the period was out. Randy Heggie and Rob McCullough earned assists.

Ellwood picked up the puck from the opening face-off and carried it the length of the ice. Ellwood skated around the ice before finding Mark Haskett alone in front. A quick pass and Haskett put it home to tie the score just 46 seconds into the period.

Then it was up to Landry. The scoring sensation scored his first shorthanded goal three minutes into the period and then added another for his fourth goal of the night midway through the period enabling Comets to earn 3 1/2 points for the game.

The club resumes action at Memorial Arena next Monday night at 8.10 p.m. against Brampton.

Juveniles avenge defeat avoiding retaliation

Staying clear of retaliatory gestures, Milton Wilson's Auctioneers juveniles gained a large measure of revenge with a 6-2 win over Streetsville Monday night at Memorial Arena.

The rough-and-tumble contest was anticipated in light of the teams' previous match-up one month earlier with Streetsville scoring a 6-1 win at home.

Milton coach Ron Dunsmore told his players before the game to avoid retaliation and the plan worked well. Streetsville drew 21 penalties, compared with Milton's 11, and Wilson's scored three power-play goals in the process. Included in Streetsville's 21 penalties were four for unsportsmanlike conduct.

The game was not without its dramatics. Streetsville was awarded a penalty shot in the second period when a Milton player tripped up a breaking forward on a breakaway. The penalty shot was good.

Later in the period, Milton winger Dan Eves and Streetsville goalie Martin Daquette met up in the Streetsville corner with Eves giving the goalie a check.

A brief fight ensued with a few punches thrown and then when Eves was making his way to the penalty box, Daquette sucker-punched him and hit him with his blocker sending Eves down to the ice. The goalie jumped on Eves and then kicked him. Daquette was ejected from the game and will probably be suspended for 10 games or more.

Wilson's jumped out quickly with a 3-0 lead in the first period. The club held the lead at 5-2 after two periods and then scored the lone goal of the final frame.

Wayne Hubbs, in his fourth game back after a brief layoff, led Milton with three goals and turned in a particularly good effort throughout the contest. Barton Rowe added a goal and three assists while Dan Eves and Grant Eves added singles.

The win came on the heels of a 7-1 loss Milton suffered to Brampton Thursday. Rob Heipel scored for Milton.

The club sent three of its players to a practice of Milton Flyers as the junior club encountered difficulties getting players. Heipel, Hubbs and Don Pickett each practised with Heipel playing Friday night. In return, Flyers will allow Jeff Vandervorst to play with the juveniles whenever it's possible.

The team has one game remaining before a two-week Christmas layover. Juveniles travel to Burlington tonight.

Optis come back to tie

Paul Allen scored two goals late in the game including the winner with just 54 seconds showing on the clock to earn Milton Optimist Club minor peewees a 5-5 tie with Orangeville Monday at Memorial Arena.

Allen's two goals capped quite a comeback by Optis who failed to get untracked in the first two periods.

Orangeville jumped out in front in the first three minutes with a pair of quick goals 23-seconds apart.

Milton's Bryan Haringa got Milton on the scoreboard with 40 seconds left in the opening frame with a goal from Adam Mead and Warren House.

However, Orangeville restored its two-goal margin with a goal three seconds before the end of the period.

The visitors continued to charge and upped the lead to 4-1 59 seconds into the second period. Optis regrouped temporarily to narrow the margin to 4-2 when Jason Bahman scored one minute later from Mead and Allen.

However, Orangeville held Milton off the score-sheet for the rest of the period and then scored the first goal of the third period five minutes into the period.

Milton's Doug Poulton started the Opti comeback with an unassisted goal midway through the frame to set the stage for Allen's two goals to tie the score. Allen's first goal was an unassisted effort while Mead with his third assist of the game helped out on the equalizer.

Orangeville's good defensive play held the usually reliable Milton offence in check for the first two periods allowing Optis just four shots in the first period and two in the middle frame.

It wasn't until late in the game Milton finally regained their confidence and started taking the play to Orangeville.

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
