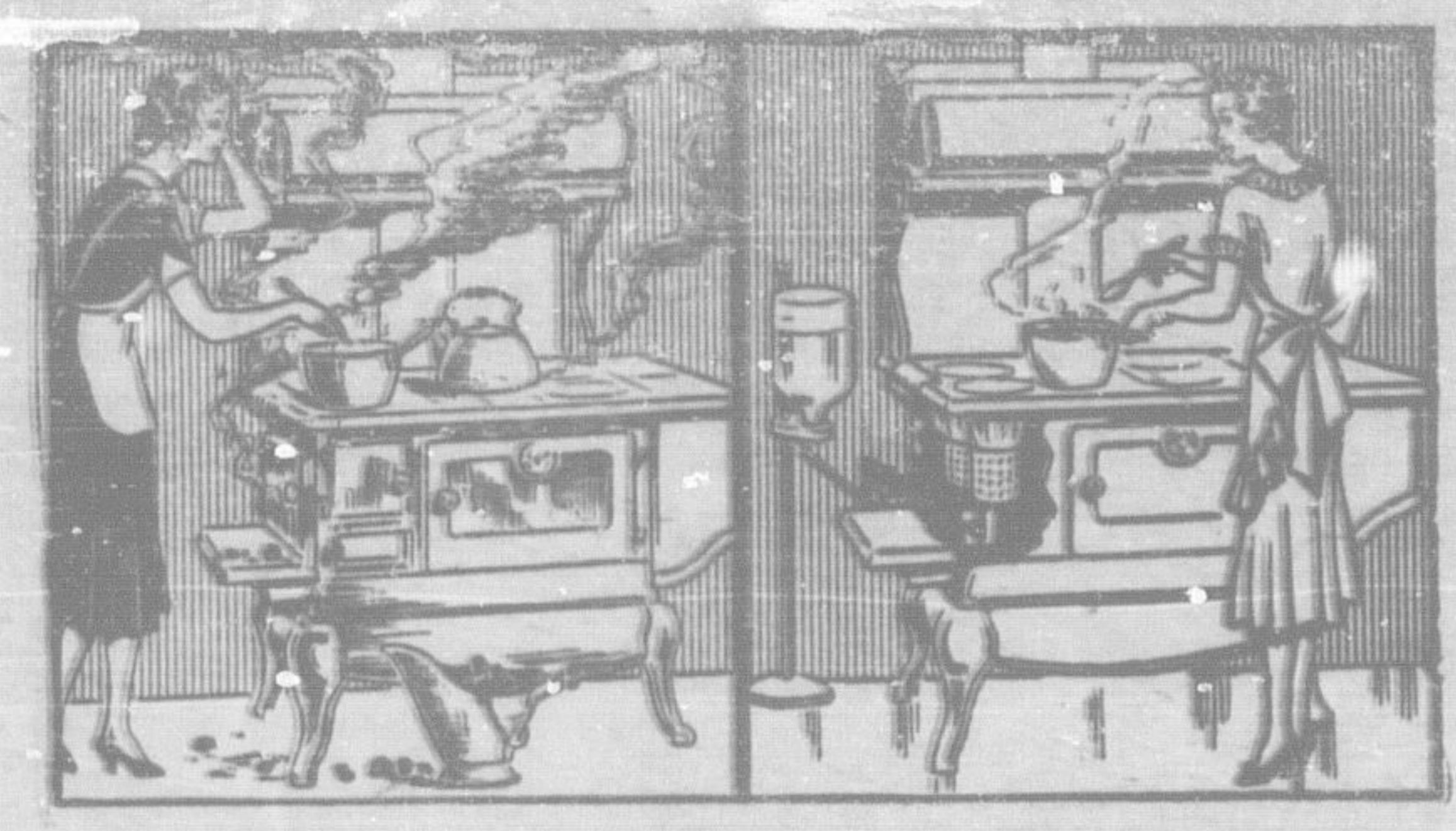

LANTERN FIRES BURN.—Fire, caused by the explosion of a lantern hanging in the passageway in front of the hotel, destroyed the bank barn, with contents, on Leveid Reid's farm, Fifth line, Esquimaux township, six miles north of Milton, at 8:30 a.m., Tuesday. All the live stock was saved, except eight fat hogs and three calves, which were burned to death. Total loss is estimated at \$9,000. Insurance carried over \$5,000.
