Absolute sanitary conditions are essential in milk production. Unless he provides clean milk, no producer can expect, nor does he deserve, to hold his customers. Milk must be clean whether used raw or subsequently treated; it is just as essential to have a clean milk for pasteurization as when it is offered for sale without treatment. Pasteurization will destroy the dangerous germs even in dirty milk, but it cannot make it clean. Milk produced under the cleanest conditions and made safe by pasteurization is not too much to demand. To the consumer falls the responsibility of demanding clean, sale milk.

Coal is one thing that refuses to follow other commodities. It declines to decline. As the Toronto Telegram remarks, "anthracite coal stands up in isolated deflance of all economic laws."
